Unique Display of Craftsmanship by Northern People

Book by Rev. Gilmour Smith Included in Exhibit at New Liskard.

In its issue of March 30th, The New Liskard Speaker gives details of an unusual display in a local book store. The display included books by Northern writers, pictures by a Northern artist and woodwork by a Northern craftsman. The article has special interest for Timmins because one of the Northern authors, Rev. Gilmour Smith, is at present a valued resident of Timmins, and another, Mr. Roscoe R. Miller, lived in Timmins for some time and was also resident of Schumacher for some months. Some of Mr. Miller's verse was published in The Advance during the time of his residence in this district. There was an extended review of Rev. Mr. Smith's book, "Modern Parables," in a recent issue of The Advance.

For its local and general interest the article from The New Liskard Speaker is given herewith in full:
"Display Work of Northerners
Something unique in the form of literary window display of books by a number of authors associated with this district of Ontario may be noted this week at the Whitewood Avenue store of Roy Anderson, who has rounded out the exhibit with specimens of woodwork turned out by a local craftsman and pictures which are the product of the brush of a Kerns township artist.

The books deal with a rarity of topics, the range including nature sketches, poetry, religious addresses and fiction. Seven authors are represented in the book column, four of them being from the New Liskard section and the other one each from Timmins, Kirkland Lake and Haileybury. The artist is Bill Jarvis, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Jarvis, pioneer settlers of the McCool area and the woodworker is Lester Kemp of New Liskard. The various authors are:
Prescott Shortt, former school teacher in Temiskaming who is now Mrs. J. S. Eddyvean, with her home for the present in Southern Ontario.

Roscoe R. Miller of New Liskard, who is living in Montreal at present. J. P. Bolger of New Liskard, and meantime serving on the Pacific Coast with the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve. In peace-time, he was with New Liskard Motors as a partner.

Charles M. Hale, secretary-treasurer of the firm of Hill-Clark-Frances Ltd., and a citizen of New Liskard in recent years.

The Rev. E. Gilmour Smith, now minister of Mountjoy United Church in Timmins, and before that for seven years minister of Cobalt United Church.

S. A. Willis of Kirkland Lake. Leslie McFarlane, formerly of Haileybury, and now living in Southern Ontario. His father the late J. M. McFarlane, was for many years principal of the Haileybury Public School. The poets are Mrs. Eddyvean, Mr. Bolger and Mr. Miller. The first named is represented in the display by "Songs from the Silence," and Mr. Miller's volume is entitled "Elixir of Morale."

In each case, a selection of poems is given. Mr. Bolger has written "Jim," which is a poem dedicated by the author as "a tribute to the men who go down to the sea in ships." It has met with quite a good reception here, according to Mr. Anderson.

The book from the pen of Mr. Willis is entitled "Around the Camp Fire," and is a collection of true short stories dealing with hunting and fishing experiences in the northern woods. Included also in what Mr. Anderson termed purely district window, Mr. McFarlane's "The Murder Tree," a work of fiction, may be found, together with other novels, "Destiny Island," by Mr. Hale, and Redemption Island which he wrote in collaboration with Evan John.

Bill Jarvis has three paintings on display and Mr. Kemp has a varied assortment of specimens of his skill at woodturning. Mr. Smith's book, which bears the title "Modern Parables," contains a number of short articles which have appeared in The Observer, the United Church paper, and also some brief addresses given by him over the radio. This volume is illustrated with woodcuts the work of the former Dorothea Sweeney of North Bay and a graduate of the Ontario College of Art. She is now Mrs. Ralph Ashton of Kirkland Lake, and has attended the meetings held at Camp Lorraine.

Use Postal District No. on Mail for Toronto City

The following memorandum from A. M. Gibson, District Director of Postal Services, Toronto, explains itself and should be read and heeded by all:
It has become urgently necessary as a result of present wartime conditions and shortages of trained help in the Postal Service to request that the Postal District Number be inserted in the address of all mail for Toronto.

Toronto has been divided into 14 Postal Districts, Nos. 1, 2, 2B, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15, each District representing a section of the city served by a Postal Station.
The new method of addressing is simply to insert the number of the Postal District after "Toronto," thus: Mr. John Doe, 540 Yonge Street, Toronto 5, Ontario.

A Toronto Postal District Number Directory is enclosed herewith, and will be noted that this booklet contains simple instructions for its use.
As a measure of wartime co-operation and in order to ensure the prompt sortation and delivery of your publications at Toronto addresses, it is suggested that you forward your galley list of Toronto subscribers and we will be very pleased to have this list keyed with the Postal District Numbers in order that you may have your plates corrected accordingly.

Valuable War Work Being Done by the Bible Society

Annual Report of Society Shows the New Testament as a "Best Seller."

Referring to the words of an airman shot down over the Atlantic "There are no atheists on a rubber raft," and a soldier in the Philippines "The New Testament is a wonder-worker in a foxhole when an air raid is on," the Upper Canada Bible Society in its annual report which has just been issued, reports a circulation throughout Canada of over 600,000 copies of the Society's "Service Edition" of the New Testament. This special edition is supplied without cost through the Chaplains Services for all Canadian men and women on active service. The Society's war services include also provision of Scripture in the required languages for prisoners of war and interned aliens, and for the sick and wounded. The Bible Society supplies for inclusion in the emergency equipment placed in life-boats and rubber rafts a copy of the New Testament enclosed in a specially designed waterproof cover.

The report is an inspiring story of the work done by the Society in the various theatres of war. The Society calls for a new realization of present demands for Holy Scripture and the opportunities of its War Services, as well as the immense demands for Scripture which will face the Society with the coming of peace. With the end of the conflict the Society estimates "an average annual circulation of twenty to twenty-five million copies for some years in order to overtake the work we cannot do now."
Other highlights of the report include:
Over 100 different languages have been required for Canada alone—46 languages were required for Ontario last year.
A circulation last year throughout Canada and Newfoundland of 390,000 volumes of Scripture.
Seven new translations of Scripture were added during the past year by the parent Society, the British and Foreign Bible Society, whose list of versions now number 758 languages.
Growing literacy in India, Africa and China add greatly to the Society's opportunities and responsibilities.
The Upper Canada Bible Society founded in 1919, as an auxiliary of the parent organization, the British and Foreign Bible Society, has over 500 branches throughout the Province of Ontario.

Income Tax Returns
FOR 1943 MUST BE IN NOT LATER THAN 30TH OF APRIL 1944
1. WHO MUST FILE RETURNS?
If you are single, and your income was over \$660.00—
Or, if married, and your income was over \$1,000.00—
Or if you had tax deducted in 1943—you must file returns.
2. WHAT FORMS TO USE
For income under \$3,000.00 use Form T.1 Special.
For income over \$3,000.00 use Form T.1 General.
3. WHERE YOU CAN GET FORMS
You can get income tax forms from—
1. Post Offices.
2. District Income Tax Offices.
Your early co-operation is requested. Over 2,000,000 Canadians will be filing income tax returns. You can help by getting your forms now, and mailing them promptly.
It is important that income tax returns be filed promptly. First, these returns must be filed to obtain credit for tax deductions. Second, to claim any refund to which you may be entitled. Third, to establish the Savings Portion of your tax, which will be paid back to you with interest after the War.
Make your returns now, but not later than 30th of April to avoid a penalty of 5% of your tax.
The unpaid balance of your 1943 tax may be paid any time before 31st of August WITHOUT PENALTY.
GET YOUR "T.4 SLIP" FROM YOUR EMPLOYER
To get a record of your 1943 earnings and tax deductions, ask your employer for a copy of the "T.4 Slip" he filed with the Government. Do this. It will save you time, and help prevent errors.
