

Large Audience Hear Addresses by Rev. J. C. Cochrane

Theme of Addresses, "The Answer of the Cross to the Questions of To-day."

Thursday evening last Rev. Dr. J. C. Cochrane presented the final of his series of addresses on the theme, "The Answer of the Cross to the Questions of To-day." The title of the concluding address was the question, "Is God Helpless?" The speeches made it very plain that there was all-powerful help for the present troubled world in the message of the Cross. His concluding address which summarized the "Answer of the Cross to the Questions of To-day," was a particularly inspiring one. It was given last Thursday evening in the First United Church, Timmins.

The series of addresses by Rev. Dr. Cochrane was a co-operative effort by the churches of Timmins for Holy Week. Large numbers of people attended these services during Holy Week and received much spiritual value from the ministry of this outstanding leader of the church.

At the Salvation Army on Monday last week Rev. Dr. Cochrane spoke on the question, "What's wrong with the World," showing that evil is no localized or transient condition but a world-wide malady. Many economic and social wrongs, such as bad housing, faulty distribution of food supplies, are rooted in wrong spiritual conditions. Man's misuse of God's gifts is the fruitful cause of the world's ills. Until the spiritual nature of man is redeemed, the material life cannot be

made right, the speaker said. On Tuesday at MacKay Presbyterian Church the question was faced, "Is Force the Ultimate Power?" and the limits of force were shown. Military force may vanquish a nation in battle, but it cannot conquer its spirit. The spirit can be conquered only by winning friendship, love and regard. At the Anglican Church on Wednesday, the subject was "Is Humanity worth saving?". The modern totalitarian state proclaims that the individual has no value in himself, but only insofar as he can serve the all-important state. The universe is vast and wonderful, but man stands supreme in value in God's creation. For him God sent his Son to the Cross, Dr. Cochrane said.

Razor Came From Ireland in 1834

Still in Use but Not for Its Original Purpose.

Mr. J. P. Foley, contractor, 211 Elm street, south, has an oddity in the form of one of the old-time straight-back razors. It was given to him by his grandfather who came to Canada in 1834 from Ireland, where he was born in 1812. Mr. Foley had always wanted that razor and eventually his grandfather gave it to him. The tradition in the family is that the razor was in the family before even the grandfather used it. In any event it is over 100 years of age and still in good shape considering recent uses to which it has been put. It has the appearance of being a hand-made affair, though the workmanship on the handle is excellent though not at all fancy like some modern razors. "If that razor could talk," says Mr. Foley, "it could tell many an outstanding story. For instance, it took thirteen weeks for it to make the voyage from Ireland, while to-day the trip is being made in as many hours." The razor is of the best steel and is English made. After a hundred years of use for shaving purposes, it still is valuable for trimming the odd corn.
