He will serve the many scattered communities, the lumber camps, power-development sites, isolated mines road camps etc., as the representative of the Church.

Goes to Jail for Two Months After Injury to Baby

Dominic Iannarelli Found Guilty of Assault on His 18-months-old daughter.

South Porcupine, Ont., May 10th Special to The Advance.
Dominic Iannarelli, of Schumacher, was fined \$50.00 and costs on Tuesday at police court here for an assault upon his 18-months-old daughter. Mrs. Iannarelli, his wife, preferred the charge against him.
While she was out at the store, she told the court, she left the baby in charge of her husband. The child was in its crib. When she came back she found the baby crying, its face swollen and red, and the little child was apparently suffering from a blow on its face, which from appearance and markings had been made by a hand. As the

husband had previously struck the baby when it was only four months old (this charge was withdrawn by the mother) she took the baby to Dr. Kineer, who told the court on Tuesday that he found the left side of the baby's face red, bruised and swollen, and marks on the forehead.

Magistrate Atkinson asked if such marks might be the result of a fall, but the doctor said that there was no sign of a bump such as would be shown after a fall, but the child's condition could have been the result of a slap of the hand.

Sergt. Douglas testified that he had responded to the mother's call and corroborated the evidence given as to the baby's injuries.

Iannarelli, who testified in his own defence, said that the baby "might have fallen out of the crib." "Were you alone with the baby?" asked the magistrate. "Yes," responded the accused. "Did the baby fall?" asked the magistrate. "I said it might have fallen," said Iannarelli. Finally the magistrate elicited that fact that the baby had not fallen, and he fined the accused \$50.00 and costs, after telling him that he would send him to jail if the offence were ever repeated.
Later Iannarelli was taken to jail to serve the two months' alternative, as the money for the fine and costs (\$72.40) was not raised.
