C. I. O. Wins Recognition Vote at Noranda Mines

Local No. 688 Mine Mill and Smelter Workers Union won a decisive victory in the vote recently at Noranda Mines to select the bargaining agency for the company's employees. The vote was conducted under direction and authority of the Dept. of Labour, Ottawa. Under the conditions laid down by the Union and apparently accepted by the Department, only 1,333 of the 1,905 men on the payroll on May 31st, were allowed to vote. The 255 men on service from the mine were among those who were not given vote in the matter. Of the 1,333 eligible to vote under the arrangement, 1,176 cast their ballots. There were 1,068 voting for the C. I. O. as the bargaining agency, only 94 against, and 14 spoiled ballots.


