The Russians are smashing the German defences in the Polotsk and Pskov sectors in the Baltics. The Soviet forces have broken through on a 93 mile front and liberated over 1000

Germany is reported from Stockholm as considering plans for shortening the Russian front. In some circles this is taken to mean that the Germans may evacuate the Baltics.

Allied forces in Italy have battled their way to within eight miles of two prized objectives. They are only 80 miles from the great port of Leghorn on the West Coast, and Ancona on the

The Japs have scored a 25 mile advance in Kwangstung province, but the Chinese forces are holding fast in Hunan province.

Two Chinese armies in North Burma have joined near Mogaung. As a result the Allies now control 300 miles of the new Ledo land supply route to
