Soldier Pays Tribute to the Work of the Red Cross

TORONTO, July 26, 1944 Members of the Canadian Red Cross Corps are following the invading forces, serving as ambulance drivers and welfare workers, They have been chosen from all sections of the Corps for their efficiency cheerfulness and adaptability. In England at hospitals which have been designated as invasion hospitals, Corps girls write letters for wounded servicemen, teach handicrafts, run a library, and keep those well enough to read, supplied with reading material.

From a soldier invalided back to Canada comes praise for the welfare work performed by Corps members. He pays a warm personal tribute to Mis Lois Macdonald of Ottawa:-"I think you should know how important this handicraft work is, especially now that many of our boys have returned from battle maimed, and sometimes with morale badly shaken. Miss Macdonald is doing a very big job indeed, and is a favorite throughout the hospital. She has succeeded in starting many soldiers to help themselves where
