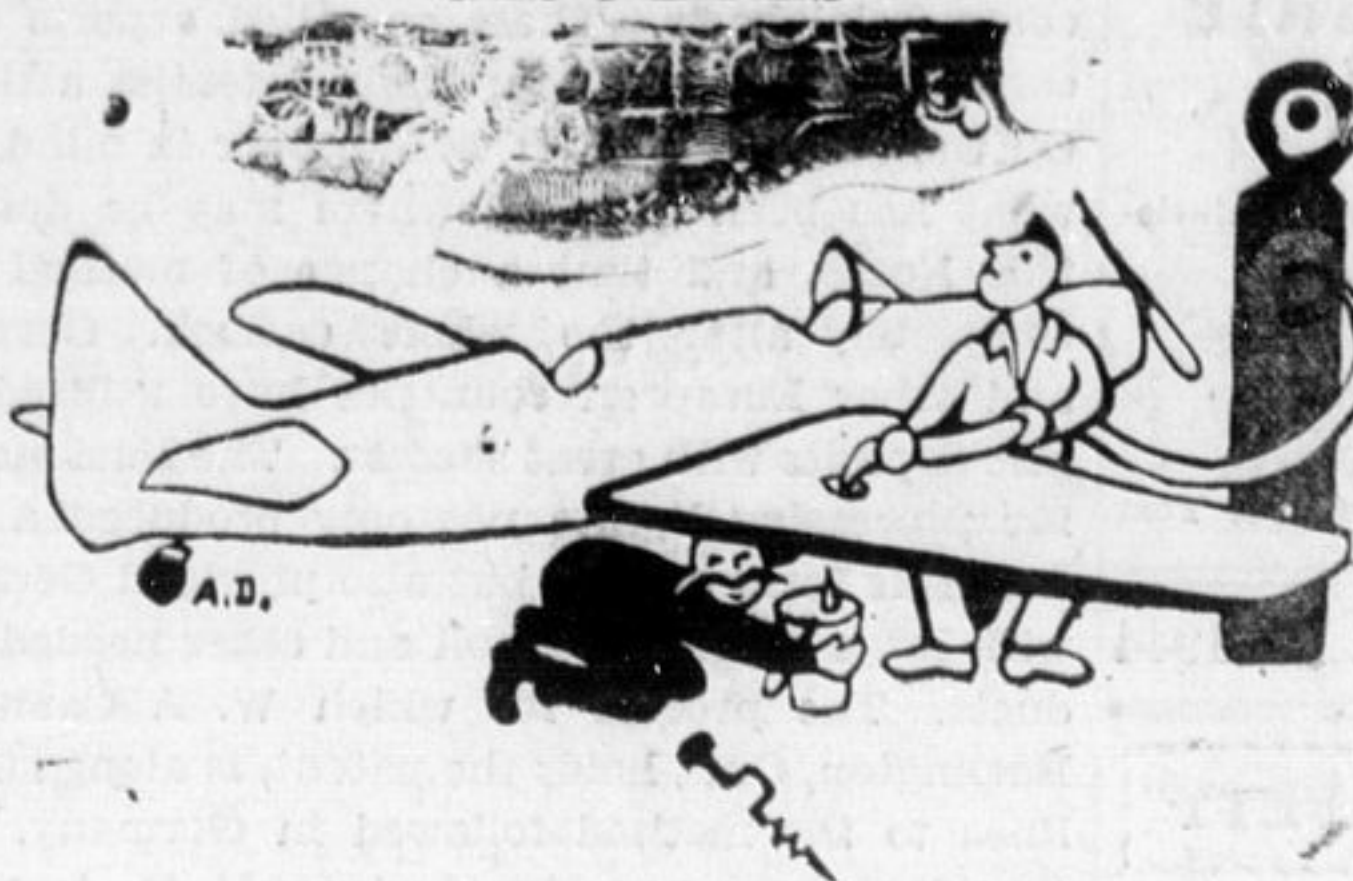

Treasurer's Sale of Land for Taxes
