## Sapper Bannerman Dies Overseas in English Hospital

### Memorial Service Held at Golden City on Sunday

Mr. and Mrs. William Bannerman, of Porcupine, received news last week that their son, Sapper Orville Bannerman, Royal Canadian Engineers, had passed away in an English hospital of pneumonia.

The sincere sympathy of all in the Porcupine Camp who know the Bannermans—old-timers of the Porcupine is offered to the bereaved parents and wife in their sudden and sad loss.

On Sunday afternoon a memorial service was held at the Porcupine United Church, Rev. J. C. Thompson officiating.

The church was filled with sympathizing friends and neighbours. The Porcupine Fire Department (of which the deceased soldier was a member) attended in a body in full uniform.

Hymns, "Lead Kindly Light," "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," and "Abide with me" were sung, and the twenty-third Psalm read. Rev. Thompson took as his text, "Thanks be to God which giveth us the Victory."

He said that at this time many brave young men are called to be with God. God has not forsaken us. He still cares, and is yet the giver of defeat and victory, life and death. Hope then in God who giveth the victory.

"The veil is lifted, clouds of misunderstanding evaporated for those who are passed on. They see as witnesses which encompass us about urging us along the Christian life."

A short obituary was read:—"Sapper Orville Bannerman was born and lived in Porcupine all his life until he voluntarily enlisted, hearing the call to serve King and Country.

"While here he attended the public school as well as the Sunday School and Bible Classes under the leadership of Rev. L. Hussey and others.

"It was known that he was always willing to help wherever needed. He was a valued member of the Porcupine Fire Brigade.

"He was working at the Bonetall Mine when he enlisted and was a favourite among his fellow workers.

"He held a deep love for his parents' home, and he was kind and generous to all.

"He has served in the army for three years. He was married just over a year ago to Mary Osaski.

"He died three days after his 23rd birthday."

## Sapper Rennie MacDonald Killed in Action Overseas

News was received this week by Mr. and Mrs. T. Gibbons that Sapper Rennie MacDonald (Red) of the R.C.E. was killed in action in France on July 13th. He went over to France from England on July 10th and was killed three days later. He lived while in S. Porcupine at the Gibbons home and was employed at the time of his enlistment as shift boss at the Pamour Mine. His parents, who live at Freeman near Burlington, received the word and wrote to his friends here. The deceased soldier was well-known and liked here by many people.
