Record Attendance Hear Magistrate at Men's Club to

Magistrate Atkinson Reviews Early Days and Law

The feature of the monthly meeting of the men of St. Matthew's Anglican Church on Tuesday evening in the church hall was the address by Magistrate S. Atkinson, guest speaker for the occasion. There was a record attendance, ninety-three sitting down to the enjoyable supper served by the ladies of St. Matthew's Guild.

In his address the Magistrate spoke of the rapid development of Northern Ontario and law enforcement since the early days. When he was first appointed, some thirty years ago, the Magistrate covered all the wide area in the former large district of Temiskaming, and he has witnessed the growth of that district and also of the district of Cochrane, the judicial district and also the northern part of old Temiskaming.

Previous to his appointment, Magistrate Atkinson pointed out, there were numerous magistrates and justices of the peace who presided at police court sittings. Payment for the services of these magistrates was made through the collection by them of fees, and naturally there was keen interest shown to hear the cases that might arise. The situation since then, however, has been changed, so that now one magistrate covers a large area, going from place to place on circuit, and being paid an annual stipend by the Province. The position of the magistrate has been greatly improved through the years, inasmuch as now a magistrate having practiced in a two years' probationary course before obtaining a definite appointment, is secure in the same for life.

The magistrate explained at some length the process of law in criminal matters, from the laying of the information to the trial and decision of the court. He enlarged upon the trial of indictable offences and other offences tried summarily. In indictable cases the accused has the right to elect to be tried by a judge and jury, by a judge without a jury, or by the magistrate. He also made reference to the nature of preliminary hearings.

Magistrate Atkinson noted that a magistrate's duties embrace a very large field, including the dealing with cases of juvenile delinquency. He stressed the very important nature of the work and the need for the greatest care being exercised to see that full justice is done and no one is wrongly convicted, and in matters being attended to in such a manner as to ensure public safety and welfare.

In a brief but witty speech, Mr. W. O. Langdon introduced the guest speaker, while Crown Attorney S. A. Caldwell expressed the thanks and appreciation of the club for the interesting and informative address.

Two other very welcome visitors were Flying Officer "Tommy" Stonehouse, who recently returned from overseas after two and one half years operational flying, and Ordinary Seaman John Newsham, R.C.N.V.R. Both these young men are members of St. Matthew's church and it was a source of great pleasure to the men present to welcome them to their monthly meeting.

Mr. W. Thompson, of London, Ont., was an out-of-town guest also present at the meeting. Mr. Thompson is the father-in-law of Rev. H. G. Cook, Rector of St. Paul's Anglican Church, South Porcupine.
