Archdeacon and Mrs. J. E. Woodall Honoured at S. Porcupine on Thursday

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A reception for Archdeacon J. E. Woodall and Mrs. Woodall held under the auspices of St. Paul's Anglican Church vestry and committee. Nearly Two Hundred Present. Presentation from Ministerial Association Archdeacon and Mrs. Woodall Going to B. C.

South Porcupine, Oct. 4th, Special to The Advance. A reception for Archdeacon J. E. Woodall and Mrs. Woodall held under the auspices of St. Paul's Anglican Church vestry and committee was held last Thursday in the Airport Hotel. They are leaving on the Northland on Wednesday of this week for Vancouver where they will in future reside. In order to give all friends an opportunity of wishing these worthy people bon voyage (and a future safe return) this reception was held, and was attended by nearly two hundred people, of all ranks and conditions of life. Mrs. Woodall was presented with a basket of beautiful red roses, Mrs. Wm. Fairhurst making the presentation. Mr. W. H. Johns (acting in the absence of Mr. F. C. Evans, Rector's Warden) then presented the Archdeacon with a black leather wallet with his name inscribed in gold containing a very substantial cheque. Also presented was a book wherein the names of all friends who had contributed to the gift were inscribed. This list of names will be treasured by the recipient, for it contains those of humble birth, of wealthy people, of all creeds, classes and conditions of men. It will speak to him of the real affection and esteem in which he is held by all in this North Country. Heading the list was the following tribute: "To the Venerable Archdeacon J. E. Woodall, D.D., upon retiring after 42 years of untiring and devoted service to the North Country. Sept. 28th, 1944 Dear Sir:—We, your friends of the North, and especially of the Porcupine Camp—of all creeds, classes and degrees of worth—have recognized that a Great Man has lived among us. We desire to be enrolled upon the roster of your remembrance, and to live in affection in your heart." The Ministerial Association, (Captain Church making the presentation) then gave the Archdeacon a beautiful bound edition of Robert Service's poems. The Archdeacon showed his appreciation and pleasure at the evident good wishes bestowed upon him and was deeply touched by the occasion. On their arrival at Vancouver, he tells us they will be met by old parishioners of the Porcupine—Mr. and Mrs. Fred Wilkins—(formerly of the Bank of Toronto in S. Porcupine) who will drive them to their new home. So many people once resident in the Camp have made their homes in Vancouver and the vicinity that they are looking forward to renewing old acquaintances there. The Archdeacon is also looking forward to re-union with his older brother who has lived in B.C. for many years, and to renewing his youth in fishing trips, etc. But we know that wherever he may in future make his home his heart will always be in this North Country which he has helped to build. And none of his friends are saying goodbye to this good man. They are saying "Bon Voyage"—and are hoping to see him again and again, when rest and a Western climate will have restored him to complete health once more.

Tisdale Buying Right of Way to Empire Townsite

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A municipal Council wishing to establish a plan should first communicate with the Board, outlining type of service desired. The Board will report to them as to the feasibility of such a plan and set forth the cost involved. A By-law will then be prepared for the approval of the Lt.-Gov. in Council and when this has been obtained the plan will be placed before the electors of the municipality. The purchasing of Patricia St., right of way to the Empire Townsite is now on the way to final completion and will be wound up within the next two weeks. Permission was granted C.K.G.B. Broadcasting Station to co-operate with Fire Departments re the Declaration of Armistice Day. The same form of Christmas parcels as last year will be made up and sent to soldiers of Tisdale. Permission was given the Reeve and Clerk to sign the Porcupine Health Unit agreement.

Funeral Services for the Late Walter Barkel

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


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
