Fire Prevention Week Observed at South Porcupine

South Porcupine, Oct. 18th. Special to The Advance.

The S. Porcupine Fire Department personnel working in pairs have endeavoured to visit every home and apartment in town, checking on possible hazards—stove-pipes, stoves, electric fixtures and wiring.

Mercantile buildings basements, furnaces and piping, heating systems, electric motors, switches and fittings, store-rooms for discarded paper boxes cartons, packing, etc., were all thoroughly inspected, and the teams report very favourable co-operation on the part of the public.

In many cases chimneys and flue linings and clean-out doors were checked.

When making inspections of schools, fire drills were carried out before inspections.

Results as follows:—
South Porcupine Public School—18 classrooms, 686 pupils enrolled. School cleared in 100 seconds using four exits. Pupils were marshalled in the yard clear of the school under supervision of the staff.

Dome School—4 class rooms. Enrollment 125 pupils. School cleared in 24 seconds, using 3 exits.

S. Porcupine High School—Eight class rooms enrollment 194 students. School cleared in 62 seconds, using 4 exits.

"It is always a pleasure to visit these schools," says Fire Chief Maxwell Smith.

"The pupils have been well trained in this form of drill and the greatest co-operation is evident from the principals and staff.

Talks on fire prevention and how and what to do in case of fire in the home were given by the Fire Chief and Inspector W. G. Skinner.

With the permission of the local theatre manager, the Fire Chief and six firemen carried out a fire drill during the Saturday afternoon matinee. The system of drill to be carried out was explained to those present—chiefly children—and on a given signal approximately 200 people of all ages marched out of the theatre in 19-25 seconds, using 4 exits.

Every precaution is taken by the manager and staff at the theatre and it should be a source of satisfaction to parents to know that all possible care and supervision is maintained.

Dies After Fall From Ore Car at the Pamour Mine

Harry Emans, employed at the Pamour Mine, was killed on Friday evening, when operating an ore train on one of the lower levels.

Deceased is thought to have fallen from one of the cars which he was riding, causing severe head injuries which resulted in his death.

He was a resident of Golden City, married with two children, and his age was around 27 years.

On Monday at noon, Rev. Breckenridge conducted a funeral service at his home in Golden City, and the remains were shipped to Porquois Junction for interment, leaving on the noon train.

The War Service Gratuity and Re-establishment Credit—
OTHER ASSISTANCE AFTER DISCHARGE

The Canadian re-establishment program gives discharged members of the services assistance under a wide variety of measures during the period when they are deciding their future as civilians.

THE WAR SERVICE GRATUITY

This became law at the last session of Parliament, and provides, after discharge, monthly payments to those honorably discharged, who enlisted for service anywhere, and to those who saw service in the Aleutian Islands, for their period of service there. It provides a basic gratuity of \$7.50 for each 30 days' service in the Western Hemisphere and \$15.00 for each 30 days' service overseas. A supplementary gratuity of seven days' pay and allowances, with Canadian subsistence allowance, is paid for each six months' overseas service. Other places in the Aleutian Islands and any other theatre of war is overseas service. Other places in the Western Hemisphere are not. Aircrew, flying outside the Canadian waters, or stationed outside Canada or the United States, and Naval personnel in sea-going ships of war are regarded as overseas service.

Monthly payments not exceeding monthly pay and allowances last received will start after January 1, 1945, unless the Act is proclaimed earlier.

RE-ESTABLISHMENT CREDIT

A re-establishment credit, equal to the basic gratuity shown above, and not including the supplementary one is available in the 10 years following discharge for constructive purposes such as purchase of a home, business, furniture or tools, or payment of premiums under Government life insurance. It can also be used for modernizing or repairing a home, for working capital of a business and other similar purposes. The re-establishment credit is reduced by any grants paid while training or continuing education, or by grants paid under the Veterans' Land Act. Training, education and Veterans' Land Act grants cannot be paid if the re-establishment credit is used, unless an adjustment is made.

AT DISCHARGE

At discharge every man and woman is advised of the re-establishment program, is given a complete medical and dental examination, and may receive free treatment for any condition shown by the examination, in the year following discharge. They are allowed to retain one uniform and certain other service clothing. All discharged since August 1, 1944, receive a \$100 civilian clothing allowance and if they have 183 days' service and receive an honorable discharge, a rehabilitation grant of 30 days' pay and one month's dependents allowance. They also receive a railway warrant to their home or place of enlistment.

AFTER DISCHARGE

Service personnel seeking employment apply through Employment and Selective Service, but in many offices they will find Veterans' Welfare Officers and other specially trained staff ready to assist them. Veterans who wish to return to their former civilian positions are entitled to reinstatement in that position, if the job still exists, if they are capable of filling it, and if application is made within three months of discharge. Under the law of Canada every ex-service man or woman with overseas service, or disability pensioners, receive preference in Civil Service appointments if qualified for the position for which they apply.
