TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files

The new general manager of the T. & N. O. Railway, Arthur H. Cavanagh, was in Timmins ten years ago on his first official visit here, being on an inspection tour of the whole line. He was accompanied on the trip by Commissioner Mac Lang and other officials of the road, including W. A. Griffin, S. B. Clement, A. J. Parr and others. There was a campaign in progress ten years ago for funds for the District of Cochrane Children's Aid Society. It was expected that another week would see the completion of this well-arranged campaign with good results. Arrangements were made ten years ago for the opening of the new Legion Hall on Remembrance day. Capt. Jules Ferry, provincial president of the Canadian Legion, was to officiate at the opening.

A frantic telephone call came into the police office ten years ago to the effect that a young lad had gone through the ice on Gillies Lake. The police called the Firemen and they all went up to the beach, but fortunately the young lad had been able to make the safety of the dry land. He was young Karlo Halonen, of 53 Rochester Street, 10 years of age. There was an epidemic in Ontario ten years ago, the theft of wheels from motor cars, J. W. Fogg having been one of the victims. A wheel was removed from his car and stolen while it was in his garage on Hemlock St. A very sad accident took place ten years ago when Leonard Howard Barker, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley G. Barker, of the Coniour Mine, lost his life. The little fellow and his four-year-old brother were playing outside with a kettle, Leonard apparently was filling the kettle from a water barrel when he over-balanced himself and fell in. The deepest sympathy was extended to the bereaved parents.

The front page of the third section of The Advance of November 8th, 1934, was made up of a number of pictures, copyrighted by the Mail and Empire, with the heading of "Gold Strike Brings Promise of Wealth to Settlers". On the front page an article told of a copyrighted despatch in The Mail and Empire stating Victor Trudel, farmer living near Ramore, had optioned his farm to Baptiste David, then proprietor of the Windsor Hotel in Timmins, and his associates for \$200,000.00. The story was told that the discovery of gold on Trudel's farm was due to the settler running his plough into a ridge of rock in one of his best fields. Among the results credited were: the smashing of the plough; the breaking of Mr. Trudel's temper; and the crush of the rock exposing the free gold.

The Timmins High School rugby team went down to defeat at the hands of the Kirkland Lake High School in a game in Kirkland Lake ten years ago, sending Kirkland Lake along the trail for the Poupore Cup. The Timmins team had entered a protest before the game, on the grounds that the Kirkland Lake field was not regular size and in very poor condition, but after holding a meeting on their return to Timmins, they decided to withdraw the protest. Lloyd Chisholm, one of the Timmins players, sustained a badly hurt ankle. Fire Chief Borland was elected to represent the Timmins and District hockey fans at the meeting of the N. O. H. A., ten years ago. Much regret was felt ten years ago in the death of Lee Kucheran, a brilliant student of the Timmins High and Vocational School. He was 19 years of age and had been suffering from heart trouble for some time.

Among the shows advertised in The Advance ten years ago were the following: Joan Crawford and Clark Gable in "Dancing Lady"; Wallace Beery and Jackie Cooper in "Treasure Island"; Herbert Marshall and F. Allen in "The Chief"; Jean Harlow and Lee Tracy in "Bombshell".

Among the local and personal items in The Advance ten years ago were the following:—"Michael Bois, 104 Main Avenue, was operated on at St. Mary's hospital for appendicitis and is doing

very well now on the way to recovery." "Mrs. Fred Curtis left to-day for a visit to the Old Country." "Alf W. Snow, for fifteen or sixteen years a popular resident of Timmins, left on Tuesday for a trip to his old home in Cornwall, England. Before leaving here he was uncertain as to when he might return or whether he would come back at all. Hosts of friends here however, will hope and expect his early return to Timmins. A gifted singer he was generous with his talent and was prominent in musical circles, as well as in the Cornish Social Club and in other activities." "Mrs. W. DeFeu had the misfortune to fall on Maple St. on Tuesday evening, breaking her arm. She was taken to the hospital where she remained for a day or so then being able to return home, and her many friends will be pleased to know that she is making good progress to recovery. Mrs. DeFeu was the second victim of the icy condition of the walks on Tuesday evening, Mrs. DeMille also being quite seriously injured in a fall on the street that night."

"John M. Greer, for many years practising law in Cochrane, and for a number of years crown attorney for the District of Cochrane, has moved his offices from Cochrane to Timmins." "M. Splane returned to Timmins last week after a visit to the South."

Late W. J. Doyle Laid to Rest in Renfrew County South Porcupine, Nov. 8th, Special to The Advance. The funeral of Mr. William James Boyle, father of three South Porcupine people (Mrs. A. McGinn, Mrs. Roy Andrews and Mrs. James Drynan), is given as follows in the "Cobden Sun" of October 26th:—"In failing health for the past two

years William James Boyle passed away suddenly on Friday, October 20 at his home in Cobden, aged 73 years. "A son of the late Wm. Boyle and his wife, Mary Bowse, he was born at Traemore, Ont., in April, 1871. He was of the generation when lumbering and river drives on the Bonnechere were in their heyday. "In 1898 he married Kate Potter, of Traemore, later going west where his wife predeceased him. In 1918 he married Mrs. Mary E. Clark and for the past 23 years resided in Cobden, 13 of which he served as village constable. "He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, two daughters and two sons by first marriage:—Winnifred, Mrs. John Jamieson, Eganville; Ida (Mrs. Matt Pettigrew), Beachburg; William and Harrison, of Cobden and four step-daughters, Mrs. James Drynan, Mrs. Andy McGinn, Mrs. Roy Andrews (S. Porcupine), Mrs. Russell Wilson, Pembroke Road; twenty grandchildren, four sisters and two brothers; Mr. Hugh McUffin, Almonte; Mrs. Alex Beatty, Nipissing; Mrs. Thos. Martin, Mrs. Angus Warren, Eganville; Charles Detroit; and Jack of Brent. He is predeceased by 3 sisters and one brother. "His funeral was one of the largest in this community and was held under rites of the Loyal Orange Lodge. Service was from his late home to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church; Mrs. Andrews, former student minister of Lake Dore, conducted the service.
