South Porcupine Soldier Wins the Military Medal

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We would like to congratulate Sergeant Jack McInnis, who the authorities state has been awarded the military Medal for gallantry in action.

His parents, Chief (Police) C. McInnis, and Mrs. McInnis, have received no word concerning it from Jack as yet.

His announcement was included in a list of 75 new ones to Canadian soldiers overseas. Jack's full title is Sergeant John Pearce McInnis; he was born at Manila, Ont., on October 8th, 1915. He was educated in S. Porcupine Public and High Schools, and worked for ten years at the McIntyre Mine before en-

listing on Sept. 17th, 1940. Before this he had been a member of the Algonquin Regiment's reserve for five years.

He went overseas on June 20th, 1941, and has taken part in a number of engagements since then.

At present he is recuperating in an English hospital from wounds sustained at Caen, and hopes to be back in the fighting line soon.
