Late Leonard Anderson Laid to Rest on Wednesday Afternoon

Funeral services for Leonard Anderson, who died unexpectedly of heart failure at his residence 101 Elm street North, at three o'clock Monday morning, were conducted in Swedish, Finnish and English by the Reverend A. I, Arthur Llewellyn Shaw, do hereby certify that the following is a true copy of a proposed by-law of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins, namely:

"TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NO. 856

BEING A BY-LAW to extend the term of office of the members of the Council and the members of all local boards as defined in the Department of Municipal Affairs Act, except the Separate School Board.

WHEREAS IT IS DEEMED desirable to exercise the powers conferred upon the Corporation by the Municipal Act Section 79 and Amendments thereto.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED as a By-law of the Town of Timmins as follows:—

- 1. The term of office of all members of the Council elected after the passing of this by-law is hereby extended to two years.
- 2. Every elected member of every local board as defined in the Department of Municipal Affairs Act, except the Separate School Board, shall notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special Act, be elected at the same time and hold office for the same term as the members of the Council, and where the term of office of a member of any such board expires before the next election of members of the Council, his term of office is hereby extended for one year.

READ a first, second and third time and finally passed this day of ... A.D. 1944.

If the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed by-law it will be taken into consideration by the Council, after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication.

The fourth day of December, 1944 at two o'clock in the afternoon at the office of the Town of Timmins in the Municipal Building in Timmins has been appointed by the Council as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk.

The votes will be taken at the annual election of members of the Council.

The date of the First publication of this notice is the ninth day of November, 1944.
