Canadian Legion's Stand on Question of Reinforcements

Letter Sent to Every Member of Dominion Parliament At the meeting of the Canadian Legion, Branch 88, Timmins, on Saturday evening, a resolution was passed unanimously asking the Dominion Government to immediately make use of the drafted trained home army, for reinforcements. In the Legion column elsewhere in this issue will be found reference to this matter. Only two members present seemed to be in favour of any other action, one of them being reported as a little noisy in his opposition to the resolution, Kirkland Lake and other branches in the North had already passed similar resolutions and from the resolutions passed all over the Dominion by Legion branches, it is evident that this is the practically unanimous stand of the Legion.

The general attitude of the Legion is also given in the following despatch from Ottawa this week:— Ottawa, Nov. 20 (Special)—The Canadian Legion in a letter to every member of the House of Commons, today sought parliamentary support for conscription of draftees for overseas service. "We know," the letter said, "that we may be asking many members of parliament to take a stand which may affect their political standing. We are asking you, however, to recognize the peculiar responsibility that is yours and come out publicly for conscription for overseas service as the only way in which we can adequately fulfil our responsibility as a nation to our fighting men and to our allies."

The letter, signed by Alex Walker, Dominion president and timed to reach members before they went into caucus, had copies enclosed of the Legion's manifest issued by the Dominion council of the organization at its recent meeting in Ottawa and of its appeal to the prime minister made in an interview with Mr. King. It also pointed out that among the Legion membership there were "many French-Canadians and representatives of other races" and added, "we hold them all in deep affection and respect." However, the letter continued, there was only one possible course that would really unite Canada and that was "by utilizing forthwith all the trained men, whether draftees or volunteers, as reinforcements for overseas."

This latest move on the part of the Legion follows a public statement calling for conscription, the interview between the Legion Dominion council and Prime Minister King, and a call to all branches to rally public opinion. Following the interview with the prime minister a brief and terse statement said that at the end of an hour and twenty minutes of discussion the minds of Legion members remained unchanged.

The Legion letter follows: "From the disclosures made during the past week it is apparent that a critical point has been reached in supplying reinforcements for our army overseas. The Legion believes that the situation demands decisive action and the replacement of the voluntary method of recruiting by conscription for overseas service and that the trained draftees available should be used for reinforcements and thus assure the men now fighting that the fullest measure of support the Canadian people are capable of giving will be theirs."

"Enclosed are two statements recently issued by the Dominion council of the Canadian Legion, which set forth the views of this organization and which, judging by the messages received from all parts of the Dominion, are endorsed by a very large number of our fellow Canadians."

"The issue is one affecting Canada as a whole. It is a moral issue as well as a political one and there is every evidence that the people of Canada are determined that she shall be true to her responsibilities and her pledged word. It is incumbent upon the representatives in parliament of both French-speaking and English-speaking Canada, and all other elements in our population, to see that the realities of the situation are brought home to their people and that no partisan, local or sectional interests shall be placed ahead of the need to support our men now fighting for us on the battlefields of Italy and Holland."

"We know that we may be asking many members of Parliament to take a stand which may affect their political standing. We are asking you, however, to recognize the peculiar responsibility that is yours and come out publicly for conscription for overseas service as the only way in which we can adequately fulfil our responsibility as a nation to our fighting men and to our allies."

"The Legion has among its members many French-Canadians and representatives of other races which make up Canada's population. We hold them all in deep affection and respect. These same elements are all represented in our armies now fighting overseas, where they are serving as true Canadians in a spirit of unity and comradeship."

"The people of Canada and the men overseas have the right to expect that the nation's representatives in parliament will face the present issue squarely and deal with it in the same united spirit, thus reassuring them of their integrity, loyalty and statesmanship. It is obvious that the need for reinforcements is urgent. Let us therefore take the only possible course that can really unite this Dominion by utilizing forthwith all the trained men, whether draftees or volunteers, as reinforcements for overseas."

Music Teachers' Students' Recital Tuesday, Jan. 16

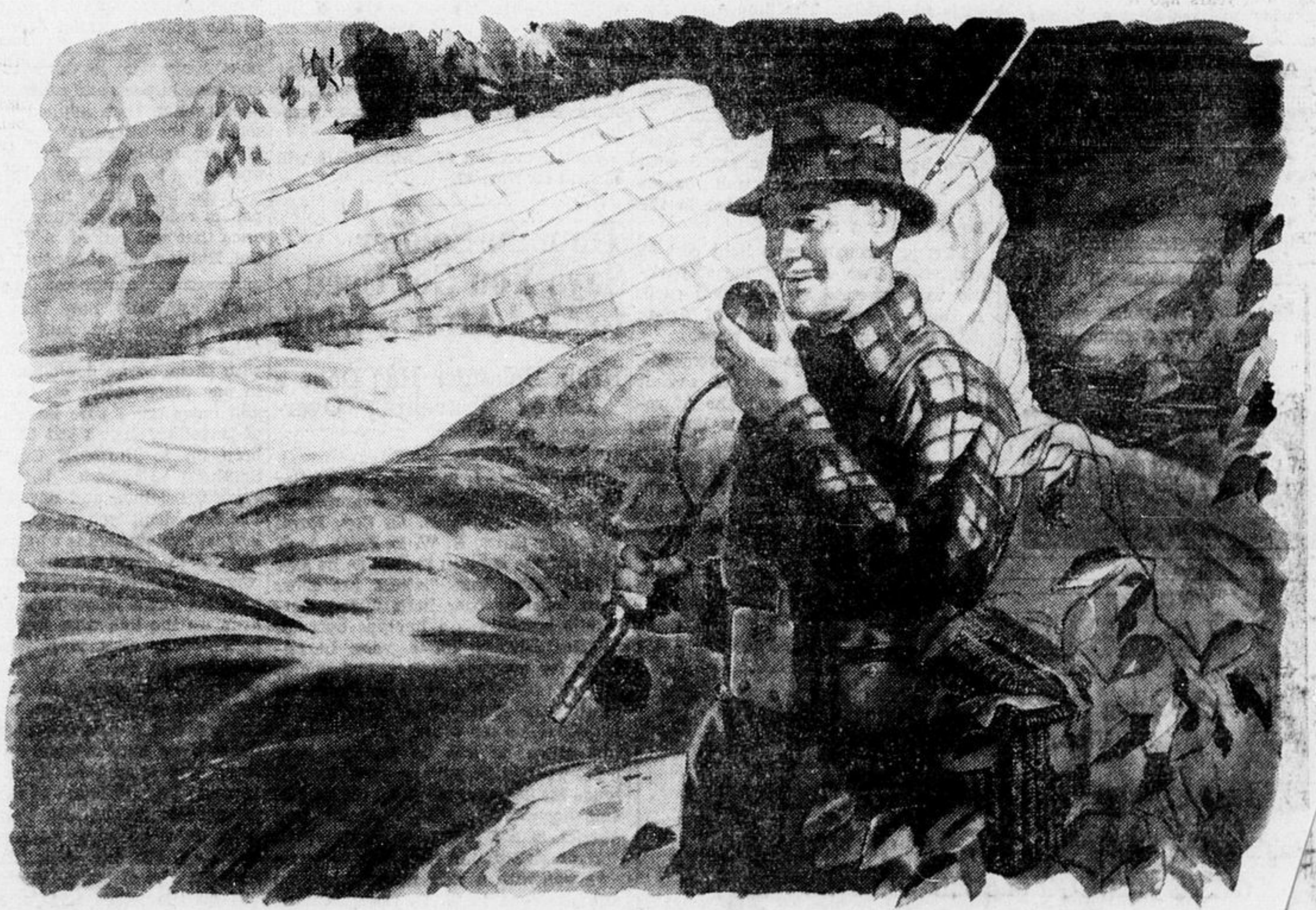
