Problems Demand Common Effort Says Dominion Bank Head

Conditions of Post-war Progress Outlined by C. H. Carlisle.

Canada can and will solve her post-war problems, if her people and industries are free from restrictive and class legislation and maintain a united effort, said Mr. C. H. Carlisle, president of The Dominion Bank, in his address to shareholders at the annual meeting in Toronto on December 13th.

Some of these conditions Mr. Carlisle defined as follows: No undue addition to our present debt; free and competitive industry; freedom to choose our way of life, and opportunity for each to share proportionately in the results of production; preservation of individual responsibility, so as not to destroy individual effort; laws enacted for the people as a whole, equitable enforced; compulsory incorporation of all organized groups, with equal responsibilities under the law; ending of misleading propaganda and unrealistic promises by politicians; simplification of our tax system to eliminate duplication and the restriction of personal and corporate activity.

"The maxim of goodwill, of efficiency, of public co-operation can only be gained when industrial organizations, labor and labor unions will plan unselfishly together, whereby the greatest economy, the highest efficiency and the maximum production may be achieved, and out of these achievements a fair and equitable distribution may be had of earnings, in dividends or wages," said Mr. Carlisle.

He deplored the Socialistic and Communistic propaganda now rife throughout Canada, advocating betterment through policies that have not at any time in history proven successful, beneficial or permanent.

"Socialism," he declared, "progresses to its final stage in regimentation and dictatorship. Socialistic Germany rapidly reached dictatorship under Hitler. A similar process in Italy culminated in the dictatorship of Mussolini. We are fighting in foreign countries a costly war to prevent such regimentation involving our country. At the same time we must be on guard not to permit the creation within our own state of an equal socialization with equal results."

The rights and responsibilities of each province in Canada are set forth in the British North American Act, said Mr. Carlisle, and assumption of any greater right by the province leads to discord and disunity. Results similar to the civil war caused by secession of the southern States, or to the collapse of France through strife of selfish parties and groups, could happen in Canada unless we cease our nagging criticism and replaced it with a spirit of better understanding and co-operation.

Analyzing the bank's financial statement, Mr. Robert Rae, general manager, noted profits of \$925,000, up \$110,000 from last year and balance at credit and loss increased by \$106,000 to a total of \$1,071,000, after dividends of \$560,000. Dominion Government taxes of \$634,508.29, and other expenses Deposits totalled \$247,839,000, an increase of \$50,121,000 those not bearing interest being up \$18,671,000 those bearing interest up \$34,835,000. Cash assets of \$48,290,000 were 19.01 per cent of public liabilities, quick assets of \$196,754,000 were 77.46 per cent. Investments totalled \$143,636,000, an increase of \$38,869,000; call and short loans in Canada \$1,325,000 and elsewhere \$3,402,000; commercial loans \$65,759,000, up \$5,520,000. The bank had 566 men and 38 women of its staff in the services; 20 men had received discharge and returned to the bank; 52 had made the supreme sacrifice, six were reported missing, eight prisoners of war.

Looking After British Brides on Way to Canada

Toronto, December 20, 1944—One of the group of women from the Canadian Red Cross Corps to escort British wives and dependents from port to port on the trip to Canada, Mrs. Margaret Harvey, Commandant of the Nursing Auxiliary Section, Hamilton detachment, has arrived home after completing the initial trip in this new service of the Canadian Red Cross Society. Mrs. Harvey went to Britain with a small group of Canadian girls, and spent a month in London, where she came in contact with the British brides when they came with their Canadian husbands to make application for the trip to Canada. "The girls, as well as their husbands, were relieved when they learned that they were to have Canadian women as escorts," reported Mrs. Harvey.

The new enterprise, at present on trial, is aimed at bridging the gap between the personal service of the British Red Cross (overseas) and that started by the C.R.C.C. at Halifax. Members of the Canadian Red Cross Corps also act as conducting officers on the wives and dependents trains from port to destination in Canada. Halifax detachment conducts the mothers and children to Montreal where Toronto detachment takes over. From Toronto, they are then conducted further to the end of their journey
