### Little Billy McCann Hit by Car. Constance Harty Hurt While Skating

When the father called him he ran, and an approaching car brushed him quite a way along the road into the snow.

This driver did all he could to avoid the child, and helped in taking him to the hospital where an X-ray discovered no bones broken.

His back is bruised but the medical authorities do not anticipate further injuries.

Another accident to a child occurred on Tuesday, Constance, the ten-year-old, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Harty, fell while skating at the Arena and broke her leg.

She is in hospital and the leg was set this morning (Wednesday), necessitating a plate insertion. Her little friends wish her a speedy recovery.

## Praises Work of Stretcher-Bearers

The following letter, given to us by a proud friend, because of the statement concerning the stretcher-bearers will, we know, be read with interest by others:— From "The Land of Windmills":

"Mud! Mud!! Mud!!!-Gosh, what a world of meaning there is in that little word.

The fall rains are on and the whole country is a mess of greasy, soupy mud. I sure hope it dries up soon (small hope!)

"When I come back (from hospital) our unit was out for a rest after some sticky stuff at Boulogne and Cap Griz Nez. Our battalion sent the Swastika banner and sword of the German garrison at Cap Griz Nez to the people of Dover.

"They took out the big coastal guns there that had been shelling Dover. They didn't have it too tough evidently as our casualties were fairly light. I went over the place after and they must have had grand air-support.

"The bomb coats were so thick that each one overlapped another.

"A good friend of mine—a stretcher-bearer in a rifle company—got shaken up pretty badly but is now back with the R.A.P. at Battalion H. Q., which is a little better than a rifle company.

"I sure hope these guys get treated right when they get back, especially the stretcher-bearer. There is no tribute too great that we or anyone can pay them.

"It takes real guts to go out and get a wounded man when shells are coming down...."

## Late Jack Johnston Had Lived in Camp Twenty-one Years

### Died in Porcupine General Hospital on Tuesday
