# Congregational Meeting of St. Paul's Falls Yesterday Anglican Church

The annual congregational meeting of St. Paul's Anglican Church was held on Friday evening in the Parish Hall, with Rev. H. G. Cook, rector, in charge.

After the meeting was opened with prayer, Mr. T. E. Catherwood was elected secretary for the meeting.

After the minutes of the last annual meeting were read and adopted Rev. H. G. Cook read the Rector's report for 1944.

Rev. Cook, reviewing the past year, commented first that it had been one of great change to the world at large and to this diocese in particular-the one happening of greatest moment was the invasion of Fortress Europe by the forces of the United Nations; some of the sons of this parish were directly engaged in that history-making undertaking. Our neighbour to the South has seen fit to return to office a President - tried and tempered in experience- a devout man, one not ashamed to urge his countrymen to call upon their God in times of stress and to thank Him in times of deliverance and triumphs.

Robert John Renison has just completed a full year as Bishop of this Diocese of Moosones. A programme of re-organization was undertaken by him with most satisfying results Parishes of a missionary nature have been re-grouped so as to operate more efficiently. New clergy have come into the Diocese allowing a few elderly ones to be released for retirement or lighter tasks. Generally throughout the diocese our Bishop has raised the stipend of incumbents. Every parish and mission and out-station has been visited by him. He has instilled into the minds of his clergy and many of their congregation his vision of a more vigorous and influential Church of England in this North Land. He realizes his obligation to the Indians of his flock and through both ecclesiastical and governmental channels is seeing to It that the sons of the forest inherit their just birthright as Christians.

Our sympathies are extended to our fellow townsfolk-Mr. A. Hogg, of Preston East Dome, Mrs. Ben Curtis and Mrs. S. Jay, of Dome Extension,in the death of their elder brother, Mr. Thomas J. Hogg of Iroquois Falis.

Mrs. Curtis and MBrs. Jay left on Saturday for the Falls upon hearing of the serious condition of their brother but although he was alive in the Anson General Hospital he was unconscious and passed on without regaining consciousness.

The funeral takes place tomorrow (Wednesday) at Iroquois Falls, his sisters and brother from here will be present; also Stanley and Jack Jay, Mrs. Stanley Millions (Mary Curtis and Mr. Dave Houston (cousin).

In addition to his widow, a son James survives and lives at home and two daughters, Mrs. Gordon Allo, of Bathurst, N.B., and Mrs. W. Vlaad of Kapuskasing.

One brother James lives in Toronto, Mr. Hogg was 57 years of age at the time of his death and had been poorly in health for some weeks prior to his death which was not unexpected.

He had been Mayor of Iroquois Falls in 1937 and 1938 and a member of the council for some years previously. He was also a Mason and member of the United Church. The body will lie in state in the United Church at Irouois Falls until the funeral. Interment will be at the Falls.
