In addition to the above list Eight Hundred and Fifty-seven (857) Pairs of Socks and Two (2) Pairs of Gloves were Knitted for the Christmas Parcels sent to the Men and Women in the Services from this District, whose names and addresses we were able to procure. A total of Eight Hundred and Seventy-four (874) Parcels were sent altogether—Seventeen (17) of these to Women. Parcels for the Men contained Christmas Cake and Confectionery, Dental and Shaving articles, and a Knitted article. Two of the Women's Parcels contained a Knitted article and all had Confectionery, Christmas Cake and Cosmetics.

The many letters of appreciation we have received indicate the desirability of continuing this practice.

Red Cross to every P.O.W. Each parcel costs approximately \$2.50.

Mrs. Kinsey assists the next-of-kin with information in sending mail and in any other way she can. During the past week many local people had inquired concerning prison camps in the path of the present Russian drive but as yet no word has been received. Several Timmins men are believed to be held in Silesia and along the Oder river.

Home-Nursing and Nursing Reserve
Mrs. George Gibson, convener of Home Nursing and Nursing Reserve, stated that although Home Nursing classes had been a peace time project, and hold the partly trained members last year it had been determined to try in a group to be at the disposal of the community should a greater need of nurses arise than the fuller trained ones could handle. This was the Emergency Reserve that had been formed.

With this in mind, a class in Home Nursing had been organized in the Fall, with a membership of 49. Of these 24 have enrolled in the Emergency Reserve. Mrs. Gibson would like all women who have taken a Home Nursing course during the past two years and if they are interested in the Reserve to get in touch with her as soon as possible.

Publicity
Mrs. W. A. Jones, chairman of publicity, expressed appreciation for co-operation she had received from the staffs of The Porcupine Advance, the Northern Broadcasting Co., the Timmins Daily Press and all other firms who had assisted in bringing the Work or appeals of the Red Cross to the notice of the public.

Welfare Work
A report prepared by Miss P. Farr, read by Mr. Pickering stated that a total of 147 bottles of cod liver oil were distributed, leaving a balance on hand of 47 bottles.

Extra Secretarial Work
Mr. Pickering asked Mrs. Chauncey to give a resume of work she does in addition to the regular secretarial duties. This includes locating of relatives in either occupied or recently freed countries, inquiries through National Headquarters for men in the Canadian forces who have not been heard from for sometime, and people in European Countries with whom relatives here have lost connections. Besides this a great deal of data in connection with the blood clinic must be kept on file.

Emergency Call by Red Cross for More Knitted Comforts

Following these reports and the election of officers Mr. Pickering asked Mr. Douglas to assume the chair. Mr. Douglas thanked those present for the confidence placed in him and asked all those who would be assisting him to work even harder in the year 1945 because of the great need. After a short period of discussion the meeting adjourned.

Chairman of Women's War Work Says Need is Desperate

Toronto, January 31, 1945—"The need for finished comforts is desperate," Mrs. J. C. Fraser, chairman of Women's War Work, Ontario Division of Red Cross stated today once more appealing to women throughout the province to adopt the 1945 slogan "KNIT AND SHIP." "Emergency requisitions from National headquarters for shipments to the seaports have taken our surplus stock," Branches, she pointed out, can help in this emergency by immediately replacing that stock, enabling the warehouse in Toronto to meet the next call. "Knit all the wool you have on hand; ship it to the warehouse as soon as possible." Wool may be obtained from any Red Cross branch or from a Women's Institute.
