Progress With Potato Production in the North Land

Agricultural Representative Believes Still Greater Progress May Be Made in Future

In last week's issue of The Advance reference was made to an address given by Mr. L. H. Hanlan, of Mathe-son, District Representative of Agriculture, at the Potato Section of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association.

The balance of Mr. Hanlan's address contains so much of interest and value that it is given herewith in full.

"A very great deal more attention has recently been given to the suitability of the soil for potato growing, than was the case a number of years ago.

"Potato growing in Northern Ontario is, in the main, being carried on as a part of the general livestock system of farming.

"The crop of clover hay is cut early, usually the latter part of June, or the first few days of July.

"Variations from the above three year rotation include a four-year rotation of potatoes, grain and hay which places 50% of the land in potatoes.

"As has already been stated commercial fertilizer is now being used much more extensively for potato production in Northern Ontario than was the case a number of years ago.

Irish Cobbler and Green Mountain have, in the past, been the two main varieties of potatoes grown.

"At the present time Warba and Irish Cobbler are grown mostly as early varieties, followed by Chippewa and Green Mountain as the two main crop varieties.

"A few are also growing Sebago and this variety is giving considerable promise as a blight-resistant sort.

"Although the farmer of Northern Ontario has always felt that they could produce almost unlimited quantities of good quality potatoes.

"This partial unreliability on the part of certain quantities of potatoes which have been produced and offered for sale in Northern Ontario, is responsible, in part at least, for the foothold which Maritime potatoes have not only been able to secure but also able to retain.

"There is a very distinct shortage of satisfactory storage space, even for what potatoes are being produced at the present time.

"The crop of clover hay is cut early, usually the latter part of June, or the first few days of July.

to market without being damaged by frost. A fair sized storage plant in each of the better potato growing sections would go a long way toward making it possible to keep the local grown potatoes available for sale to the consuming public during every day in the year.

"The title of this talk is "Progress with Potatoes in Northern Ontario" but unfortunately we are forced to admit that the progress has been somewhat slow.

"There were eleven entries in this competition. Each grew at least one acre. The yield was 683 bushels of marketable potatoes per acre.

There is a fair-sized local market as is shown by the number of cars of potatoes that are shipped in from outside points each year.
