### Programme for V-E Day Celebration at South Porcupine

South Porcupine, May 2nd—A citizen's meeting representing the various organizations of South Porcupine was held in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building on Tuesday, May 1st, at 7:30 p.m.

The meeting was opened by Reeve V. H. Evans and Mr. T. R. Langdon, President of the South Porcupine Kiwanis Club, was nominated as chairman.

A general discussion took place, committees were appointed and the following programme was decided on:

In the event of V-E Day being announced in the forenoon, church services will be held in all churches at 2:00 p.m. and all citizens are respectfully requested to attend the services. If V-E Day should be announced in the afternoon, church services will begin one hour after the announcement. A civic celebration and a patriotic demonstration will begin one hour and a half after the commencement of the church services.

The programme will be as follows: A parade of all organizations will be formed on Main St. in front of the Municipal Building and a band will be in attendance. The Committee is anxious that each organization be responsible for as many floats and flags, etc., as possible.

The parade will cover a defined course ending at the Ball Grounds. Upon arrival at the Ball Grounds will form into a square. The ceremony will open with the singing of the National Anthem followed by a two minutes' silence in memory of the late president of the U.S.A., Franklin Delano Roosevelt. Following the period of silence a Thanksgiving and dedication ceremony will be observed by members of the clergy. At the conclusion of the service there will be addresses by His Worship Reeve Victor H. Evans and Mr. Percy Andrews, president of the Local Branch of the Canadian Legion.

In the evening, under the auspices of the South Porcupine Fire Department, a spectacular fire works display will commence at 9:00 p.m. in the ball grounds.

The committee wishes to emphasize the fact that V-E Day will be celebrated as above outlined regardless of the day of the week that it is announced.

The committee in charge of decorations urges all citizens to decorate their places of business and homes.

The day following V-E Day will be proclaimed as a civic holiday by the municipal officials of the Township of Tisdale.

### Twelve Fire Calls Here During the Past Week

There were twelve fire calls during the past seven days, one of them being a false alarm and accordingly turned over to the police for investigation.

One odd cause for a fire happened Saturday. At 7 Montgomery avenue a chimney had been cleaned out and the soot left in the basement. This soot ignited, but its state was discovered before any damage was done.

The most of the other calls were grass and bush fires, only two of them being of particular moment. In one of these cases two boys were seen starting the fire among the grass and these were picked up by the firemen and handed to the police to impress on the lads the seriousness of their trick. The other bush fire was remarkable for its stubbornness, the firemen having to fight it from 1:15 p.m. to 4:25 p.m. Monday. It was south of the tracks.

There was a house fire yesterday at 12:23 a.m. at 44 Southern avenue that caused several hundred dollars damage before it was curbed. The house was occupied by M. Foisey and N. Neddo, the former being the owner and using the basement apartments. The cause of the fire was unusual, being due to the explosion of a can of tar placed on the top of the stove to thin it down. The fire had a strong grip before the firemen were called. Indeed the explosion seemed to throw the fire all over the building. After a lively battle in the blackest sort of smoke, the firemen got this fire down and out.

### Taxi Driver Given Dismissal Tuesday on Serious Charge

At police court on Tuesday Lloyd Doolan, taxi driver, was given dismissal on a charge of rape. A married woman gave evidence to the effect that the accused had overpowered her after driving to a lonely place some miles out of town. Greg. Evans, who was counsel for the accused, stressed the fact that according to the woman's own evidence she had not put up enough resistance to warrant a charge of rape. Only one article of her clothing was even slightly torn, and when she was examined by the doctor he found no signs of bruises or other evidence of violence. Mr. Evans also pointed out that she allowed quite a time to elapse before seeing the police, and that later she and her husband discussed the question with the father of the accused and had considered withdrawal of the charge. The woman in question explained that they did not know that the services of the Crown Attorney would be theirs without cost, but had been told that it would cost hundreds of dollars for law costs and they had no money. In dismissing the case the magistrate emphasized the fact that it was essential to protect passengers in taxis and drivers of cars should remember this. There was not sufficiently strong evidence, however, to put the accused on trial at a higher court.

A charge of assault laid by Tommy Jack against Jerry Doherty was dismissed when the weight of evidence suggested that it had been an argument about St. Patrick and that the accused seemed to be about as badly beaten up as the complainant.

For failing to report a car accident L. Simard was fined \$50 and costs. A charge of dangerous driving was withdrawn.

A gentleman charged with being "found-in" in connection with a liquor case last week explained to court that he visited the house at the request of some friends from Kapuskasing. Not only did he not go for any liquor, or get any liquor, but he said he did not

know that any irregularities might be likely to happen at the place. The magistrate let him go as just an innocent visitor.

Four drunks (one of them a lady) were each charged \$10 and costs later a charge of vagrancy was laid against the lady. She will appear next week to answer to this charge.

Two speeders paid \$15 and costs for speeding at over 40 miles per hour and another paid \$10 for speeding under 40.

The charge by the court for passing a stop sign was \$1 and costs.

### Broken Light Bulb Cause of Serious Fire at Liskeard

(From New Liskeard Speaker)  
 Damage which it is estimated will reach at least \$9,000, and possibly may exceed that figure, was caused at the factory of S. D. Eplett & Sons here on Tuesday afternoon, when fire which had an unusual origin swept through part of the hollow tile-walled building used as a garage and machine shop in connection with the refrigeration of the plant. Nelson Morrison, who at the time the blaze broke out as an electric light bulb accidentally broken ignited gasoline fumes was working underneath an automobile, suffered severe burns to the right forearm as high as the elbow, but he managed to drive a refrigerator truck to safety before the garage part of the building was engulfed in flames.

The truck was not affected, but the car, owned by Gordon Eplett and being prepared for a trip to Noranda, is a total loss. At the factory yesterday, Mr. Eplett said further revision of the loss may be necessary after it is possible to complete the investigation under way, and he told The Speaker that the damage is covered by insurance. Mr. Morrison, who is under the doctor's care, is making satisfactory progress, it was stated yesterday. He had a narrow escape, it was stressed at the plant, for the fire shot through the building with great rapidity, one man declaring the building was a sheet of flame almost immediately.

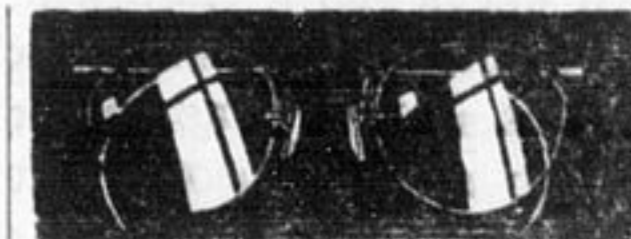
Fire Chief Roy Grills said later that,

after two streams of water had been brought into play, the blaze was under control within a short time, but the fire continued to burn among the shavings which lined the space between ceiling and roof, the chief said. Mr. Eplett estimated equipment in the garage to be worth \$500, of which half represented the value of Mr. Morrison's personal kit of tools. The garage part of the structure is a total loss, it was stated, and the machine shop suffered chiefly from heat and smoke.

The Speaker was told Mr. Morrison was working under the automobile, replacing an exhaust pipe, and using an electric light bulb attached to an extension cord. The bulb, in the usual cage was lying on the floor, and in some manner it is stated to have been struck by a rod, breaking the glass. Immediately, the gasoline fumes caught fire and this spread quickly, as the tank of the car had just been filled with twelve gallons of gasoline. Mr. Morrison managed to get out from under the car and, as the fire raged around him, reached the refrigerator truck, standing nearby, and drove it out into the open air.

## VOTERS' LIST ACT PART IV

### Notice of Preparation of Voters' Lists

FOR THE PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN CITIES AND TOWNS WITH A POPULATION OF 10,000 OR OVER, AND IN TOWNSHIPS BORDERING ON CITIES HAVING A POPULATION OF 100,000 OR OVER

### Notice of Sittings of the Revising Officers in the Electoral District of Cochrane South

Public-Notice is hereby given pursuant to Section 81 of the Voters' Lists Act of the revision of the voters' lists for all polling subdivisions for the Town of Timmins in the Electoral District of Cochrane South

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that sittings will be held by the revising officers at the times and places set forth in the schedule hereinafter set out. Any person qualified to vote at the pending election to the Legislative Assembly and whose name has been omitted from, or incorrectly entered in, enumerator's list of voters is called upon to attend at the times and places hereunder mentioned for the purpose of having their names enrolled upon the voters' list to be used at the said election. Complaints which have been properly filed with reference to names wrongfully entered upon the enumerator's lists will be heard at these sittings.

Voters' Lists for this Electoral District will be open for public inspection at the office of the Returning Officer located at Kirkland Lake between the hours of 10.00 and 12.00 in the forenoon, and 2.00 and 4.00 in the afternoon and from 8.00 to 10.00 in the evening, on Tuesday, the 15 day of May, 1945.

The Lists may also be inspected at the office of the Clerk of the Municipality between the hours of 10 and 12 in the forenoon and 2 and 4 in the afternoon and 8 and 10 in the evening of Tuesday the 15 day of May.

### SCHEDULE

Registration and Revising District No. 1 includes all Polling Subdivisions Nos. in said Town of Timmins. Sittings will be held for Registration and Revising District No. 1 at Town Hall Timmins between the hours of 10.00 to 12.00 in the forenoon and 2.00 to 4.00 in the afternoon of Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, the 16th, 17th, 18th, days of May 1945. (or as the case may be)

### NOTE

74. Within four days after the posting up of the polling subdivision list by the enumerators as provided in section 73, any person whose name has been entered on any of the said polling sub-division lists in the electoral district may file with the proper clerk, of the revising officer appointed for the polling sub-division, a complaint that there has been included in the polling sub-division list as compiled by the enumerators, the name or names of persons who should not be entered therein. Such complaint shall be prepared according to Form 26 and shall set out the reasons for complaining and shall be accompanied by an affidavit of the complainant, Form 27, and the same shall be filed with such clerk of the proper revising officer not later than the first day appointed for the sittings of the revising officer.

Copies of form 26 and 27 may be obtained upon application to the Returning Officer or to the Clerk of the Municipality.

86. Any person resident in any polling division included in the registration district whose name has not been included or has been incorrectly included by the enumerator in the list of voters for such polling sub-division, may apply at the place of registration for the registration district to have his name included in the list or to cause the entry in the list relating to him to be corrected.

87. Every person so applying shall sign an application, Form 29, in which all the information required by the said form shall be sufficiently filled in, either by the applicant personally or by a revising officer at the applicant's request, and before entering the name of any such person in the list of voters, the revising officer shall satisfy himself that the applicant understands the effect of the statements in the application and that he is entitled to have his name included in the list or to have the list corrected pursuant to his request.

88. Whenever the language of the applicant is not understood by the revising officer, an interpreter may be sworn and may act, in the event of inability to secure an interpreter, the application shall, for the time being, be refused.

89. If it appears to the revising officer that the applicant understands the effect of the statements in the application, Form 29, and that the applicant's name should be included in the list, or that the amendment thereof which he requests should be made, he shall certify accordingly by signing the said application.

90. If, in the opinion of the revising officer the statement made by the applicant in his application do not show that the applicant is entitled to have his name included in the list, or to have the list amended as requested, he shall advise the applicant that his application is refused, stating the reasons for such refusal, which reasons he shall endorse on the application form.

91. If any person who claims to be entitled to have his name included in the list of voters or to have the entry relating to him therein corrected is unable personally to attend the registration and revising sittings by reason of sickness, disability, or necessary, temporary, unavoidable and bona fide absence from the municipality in which the registration area is included, then a relative of such person by blood or marriage, or his employer may, if he has a sufficient knowledge of the facts, appear before the revising officer and complete the application, Form 29, to have such person's name included in the list of voters, or to have the list corrected, as the case may be.

92. If the relative by blood or marriage, or the employer so appearing, substantiates—

- (a) the cause for the non-appearance of the person immediately concerned to be as hereinbefore set forth;
- (b) the existence of a relationship by blood or marriage or the relationship of employer and employee; and
- (c) the facts relevant to the qualification, name, address or identity of the person immediately concerned so far as such facts are requisite to cause the name of such person to be included in the list, or to cause the list to be corrected, as the case may be.

the revising officer may act upon such application as if the person immediately concerned had appeared in person before him.

Form 29, referred to in Section 89, may be obtained from the Revising Officer.
