Geen-Bartlett Recital Delights Large Crowd

A large and most appreciative audience attended the recital in the McIntyre Gymnasium last Saturday evening to hear Reginald Geen pianist and Edouard Bartlett, violinist.

These two artists are becoming a part of the Porcupine world of music, and one of the most charming features of their recitals is the absence of formality and temperament so frequently encountered in artists of their ability and standard.

Mrs. Gamble, president of the Porcupine Music Teachers' Association, opened the recital with a few brief words of introduction, and from the very first moment the two artists held the rapt and undivided attention of their audience, which included many young people.

Each of the items on the programme were announced by the performers with a brief outline of the theme and a word or two about the composer, these remarks very frequently being tinged with humour.

The recital surpassed expectations by the brilliance with which the most difficult selections were handled.

Mr. Bartlett opened the programme with a violin Concerto in A Minor by Vivaldi, who has been described as the Chopin of the violin. A composition by Bach, Concerto in D Minor and Legende by Wienawski were skillfully played.

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Number of Cases at Police Court This Week at Timmins

V. E. Day Disturbed Even the Police Court Here. Though None of the Cases Arose from the Event

Even the Timmins police court was turned from its normal ways by the big event of this week—"V.E. Day." It is seldom indeed that the Timmins police court is not held on Tuesday afternoon but this week it had to be postponed to Wednesday morning, as Tuesday was a holiday observed by nearly everybody.

There were quite a few cases before the adjourned court, though none of them originated from V.E. While the police were perhaps inclined to be lenient on such an occasion, they had no call to be otherwise, for the order was unusually good in every way.

Some of the cases promised to be serious. David Latendresse was charged with disorderly conduct and vagrancy, the grounds for the prosecution being more serious than the charge suggested.

James Johnston, charged with being drunk in charge of a car, was given the usual ten days, his car impounded for three months, and his license suspended for six months.

Two on a bicycle brought some words of warning as to the danger of such practices, and the case was adjourned till called on.

At next Tuesday's police court Nick Barilka will be called to answer to three charges of assault, occasioning bodily harm, and one of robbery with violence.

William Chamandy, on a charge of illegal possession of liquor was also fined \$100 and costs.

There were three cases of disorderly conduct, but they all originated before V.E. Day.

An interdicted person found imbibing was fined \$10 and costs.

Two for having beer illegally were each fined \$10 and costs.

One drunk (a lady) was charged \$10 and costs.

\$10 and costs was what an ordinary speaker paid.

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The R.C.M.P. had a charge of illegal possession of spirits against Lucien Spencer. He was fined \$100 and costs.

Roger Deslaurier charged with attempting to break and enter a garage with intent to commit theft, was handed a six-month sentence.

A young woman charged with endangering others while suffering from a communicable disease was given an indefinite term in the reformatory, not to exceed six months.

Maurice Gamache, 75 Wende avenue, and two brothers, Leo and Joseph Arthur Gamache, were charged jointly with illegal possession of intoxicants.

Maurice was fined \$100 and costs, while the cases against the other two brothers were dismissed, the whole responsibility being placed on Maurice.

The premises he occupied on Wende were declared public for a year.

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Barilka will be called to answer to three charges of assault, occasioning bodily harm, and one of robbery with violence. Barilka, who is out on \$2,000 bail, is also the defendant in some other cases of assault to come before the court at Cochrane, having been committed for trial here in police court some months ago.
