Canadian Aircraft Should be Designed Follow Its Own Advice for Northern Use

Promising Field for Canadian Aircraft Construction

Canadians can and must design and build aeroplanes suited for the conditions of our great northern districts. This is the conclusion of one of the pioneers of civil aviation in this country. H.A. "Doc" Oaks, of Port Arthur, in a paper presented on April 18th to the Canadian Institute of Mining and a modest competence.—Hallfax Chron. Metallurgy at its annual conference in Quebec City.

> "We hear a certain amount of talk about a plane that would be suitable alike for use by sportsmen for training, and for exploration in our northern regions. The characterisities of the frontier plane, in northern Canada or on any other frontier, are definitely not those of the sporting plane nor are they similar to the requirements

in a training plane. "Any attempt at a comprise design will lead to a hodge-podge which will certainly not will the flying needs of the northern frontiers, whether for

freighting or exploration. "The design we need for this important field will not likely come from the United States or Britain as they did before the war. The British and American designers are busy on the world-girdling giants of tomorrow. Our post-war aircraft industry cannot compete in this field, but we can, without too much effort-but given the necessary initiative - established ourselves as builders of frontier aircraft for Canada and for other parts of the world where there are frontiers."
