Two Airmen Return from Overseas to South Porcupine

Other Items of Interest from South Porcupine and District

South Porcupine, May 28th. Special to The Advance.
Two of our local Airforce men arrived in South Porcupine on Saturday morning after coming from England on the S.S. "Le de France" which docked at New York on May 22nd, carrying wounded men of both American and Canadian forces, Nursing Sisters, freed prisoners of war and repatriated men of all services. They report a wonderful reception when they docked in America. They are P.O. Reginald Clark, R.C.A.F., son of Mr. and Mrs. Milas Clark, of town, and P.O. Edward B. McVey, (son of Mr. and Mrs. J. McVey, of Sudbury) who formerly worked at the Hallnor Mine. P.O. Clark returned after completing a tour of fifty operational flights on Mosquito bombers with the R.C.A.F. He joined the R.C.A.F. in 1942 and graduated as a Navigator in Chatham, N.B., in December 1943. He went overseas in February 1944. He has thirty day leave with his wife on Golden Ave., and his parents on Boundary Lane. He was welcomed at Montreal by his wife, P.O. E. B. McVey has a tour of twenty-nine operational flights over Germany to his credit. He flew Halifax bombers with the R.A.F. He joined the R.C.A.F. in July, 1942, graduated as Navigator at Crumlin in October, 1943, and went overseas the same month. Received his commission in November, 1944. He was greeted by his wife and two children, the younger aged seventeen months—a son whom he had not seen before. He is home for thirty days and then will report to Trenton.

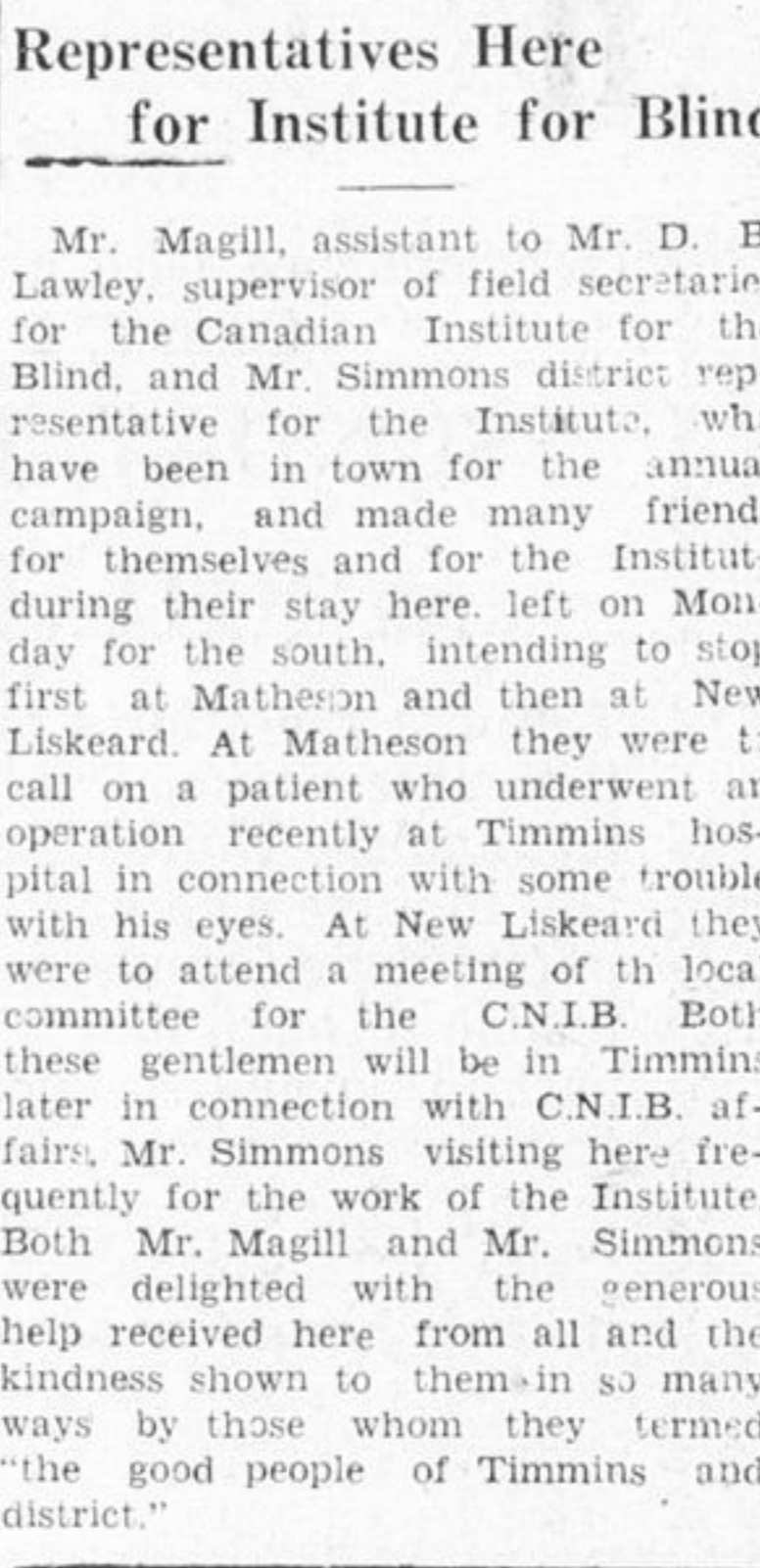
Funeral on Friday of the Late N. Matic, Schumacher

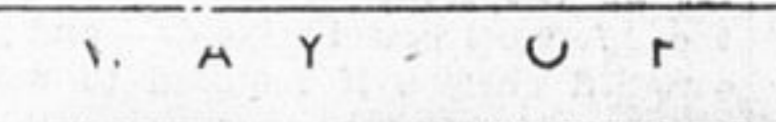
