A five-year plan for further industrial development is being considered. This Hydro-Electric Commission is purely provincial and as its uses increase it will play its part in improving the living conditions of more and

more people. Russia, New Zealand, India, and Australia are investigating our Hydro development, and are considering information, investigators working with the Hydro Company.


