S. Porcupine Kiwanis Hear talk on Hydro Developments

At the regular meeting of the Kiwanis on Monday night, at the Airport Hotel, three men who have assisted the Club with the Air Cadets, were special guests. They were Mr. George Burch, Mr. Lyn Huggins and Mr. Jim Douglas.

The chief guest (speaker) of the evening was Mr. Hillier from the Toronto office of the Hydro-Electric Power of Ontario. Mr. Winton S. Adamson of the local Power Co. was introduced by the President Rud Langdon who in turn introduced Mr. Hillier and Mr. Roy Douglas of the Haldenbury office.

Mr. Hillier gave a most interesting and Educational address on the growth of "Hydro" in Ontario illustrated after by a wonderful picture "Romance of a River".

This showed the diversion by dam of a Northern river, out through the height of land to Nipigon Lake and hence to Niagara. He gave the History of Hydro—a publicly owned project operated to provide the people of Ontario with Electric Power.

2½ million horse power of Electricity is used in Ontario now with sources distributed all over the Province.

He quoted statistics showing that Ontario is the banner province of Canada with its Hydro power its agricultural and mineral wealth and industrial projects with Hydro playing an important part in their development.

A five-year plan for further industrial development is being considered.

This Hydro-Electric Commission is purely provincial and as its uses increase it will play its part in improving the living conditions of more and more people.

Russia, New Zealand, India, and Australia are investigating our Hydro development, and are considering information, investigators working with the Hydro Company.

Mr. Hillier was thanked by Vice President Reeve V. H. Evans for his excellent talk.
