# TEN YEARS AGO IN TIMMINS

From data in the Porcupine Advance Files

Ivor Laakso, of South Porcupine was killed instantly when struck by a truck driven by Imari Kolvi, of 91 Third Ave. The victim died almost immediately having sustained a fractured skull, broken neck, and internal injuries. Charges of reckless driving were laid, pending investigation of the accident.

James Francis McLean, eight year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. MacLean, 2 Cherry Street, passed away in St. Mary's Hospital, ten years ago, following an appendix operation from which he appeared to be recovering. Dr. A. S. Porter sustained a broken collarbone and some minor bruises when he was knocked down by a car at the intersection of Fourth Ave. and Pine Street in 1935.

Ten years ago this week it was announced by Al Pierini that Timmins was to have a cabaret. The leader of the "Vagabond Kings" orchestra said the club would be in a new building on Second Ave. between Pine and Spruce Street and would be called the Club Hollywood. Alfred Manchiello, formerly of Bigwin Inn, and a number of well known Toronto places, had been engaged as chef and cabaret and straight dancing were to be on the weekly programme.

On Sept. 20th, 1935 Miss Delia Blow and Mr. Robert Webb were married in a quiet evening ceremony at St. Matthew's Anglican Church. Rev. Canon R. S. Cushing officiating. The bride who was gowned in white was attended by Miss Gwen Webb and the groomsmen was Mr. Thomas Goodman, Mr. Yourix gave the bride in marriage. A reception was held at the home of the groom. The honeymoon was spent in Windsor, Niagara, Detroit and other southern centres.

The last match of the season for the ladies section of the Timmins Golf Club was played on Sept. 27th 1935. Mrs. H. Darling and Mrs. Gillies won low gross score and Mrs. Burke and Mrs. McCrae won the low net.

Ten years ago this week Joe Louis, the brown man from Detroit, kept his promise when he administered the most cruel beating ever seen at the big Yankee Stadium for many and many a year. Baer, still not in the best of condition, tried to keep his famous smile even though his face was streaming blood. He even tried to keep going by doing a bit of his old time clowning, but it was no go. In the fourth round, after two minutes and fifty seconds, he knew he was licked. Head bowed, his legs almost too weak to lift his heavy body upright, he knelt in the corner until the count of nine.

Over eight hundred persons attended a mammoth banquet here on September 25th, 1935, which was held in honour of Rev. Fr. Theriault on the occasion of the twenty fifth anniversary of his entry into the priesthood.

The skating rink was the scene of the affair and old-timers, together with more recently arrived citizens and prominent guests joined hands in giving the genial priest a party such as never had been seen here before.

Following the serving of a fine dinner to the guests, a toast was proposed to Fr. Theriault by the chairman, Oslas Sauve, and the rafters rang with "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow", led by the Mayor.

His Worship Mayor Richardson spoke on behalf of the citizens of the town, stating that since Fr. Theriault was one of the town's real pioneers, the greeting of the whole town would be extended.

Hon Paul Leduc, minister of mines in the Ontario government, was the second speaker of the evening and brought greetings, not only from Toronto but also, from Ottawa.

Noah A. Timmins, president of the Hollinger Mines, spoke in French to the gathering. He recalled memories of the old days of the camp, of the Hollinger and of St. Anthony's Church and hoped for the continued prosperity of the town that bears his name.

Rev. Fr. Pelletier, of Iroquois Falls, brought congratulations from the paper town.

Jos. A. Bradette, M. P. for Cochrane riding, spoke in French and English. Dr. H. H. Moore, M.O.H. and pioneer physician said he had been associated with Fr. Theriault since he arrived in town.

Other speakers were Dr. LaHaye.

# Finnish Ladies Held Red Cross Meeting

The second regular work meeting in September of this Canadian Red Cross Unit of the Finnish United Church ladies was held Thursday evening, Sept. 20th, at the home of the Rev. and Mrs. A. I. Heinonen, 53 Rea street South. Mrs. Rachel Leivo, president of the Unit, presided during the business period. A letter from the national headquarters of the National Clothing Collection was read, and it was unanimously decided that each member respond to this worthy appeal and also recommend to all her friends to give any help she can give in getting the people of the liberated countries in Europe clothed before the cold winter sets in.

The monthly report of the Timmins Branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society was also read, and a lively discussion followed. The great needs of the people in the war ravaged countries were reviewed. The hardships being endured by relatives and friends of local people of Finnish origin were described by those present.

It was decided to find out what chances there are to help the war orphans and other needy people in Finland through the Canadian and International Red Cross. It was also decided to start at once making articles of clothing for children and women and to continue knitting for the Red Cross and to continue sending parcels of small luxuries to the soldiers, sailors and airmen who have enlisted in the Porcupine Camp and who are still overseas.

The devotional period was conducted by the Reverend A. I. Heinonen. After the business meeting, delicious refreshments were served by Mrs. Heinonen, assisted by her daughter Leah and Vera. It was decided to accept the invitation of Mrs. Anna Peterson to hold the next work meeting at her home, 144 Commercial Ave.

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# "SALADA" TEA

It will not be bread man or ice man that calls when these cards go up in windows along Kingston's streets—unless the gentleman is short-sighted or absent-minded. It'll be the clothing collection man instead, and he will pick up the bundle of clothes and pairs of shoes that the lady of the house has ready for him.

The cards will, of course, look something like those that housewives put up in their windows for ice or bread. The only difference is that a huge "C", meaning clothes, will be printed on them. From October 1st on, Kingston's housewives will be asked to display the cards prominently in windows when the clothing is to be picked up by trucks or cars arranged for by the clothing collection committee there. So, twenty days, "C" will stand for "clothing" as far as the citizens of Kingston are concerned.

All costs of printing the cards and house-to-house collection of the clothes are being borne by Kingston War Services out of waste paper salvage funds.

**Tires for Motorists But**

Canada's rubber industry is hoping for a production that will turn out 240,000 tires a month during 1946—56% above the level of 1939 providing no material shortages or disruptions due to labor disturbances upset the schedule, reports The Financial Post's Ottawa correspondent.

What that means to the Canadian is this:

If he has any reasonable claim to being an essential driver (during 1946) he will get all the tires he needs.

If everything goes well, there should be about two tires available for each of the 400,000 non-priority cars over the year.

Meanwhile, advised The Post, tires for your car are still scarce and are likely to remain scarce for some months.

The immediate shortage is due to disappointing tire production during July and August. One plant was out of production for the entire month of August due to strike conditions. Others ran short even after liberal allowance for holiday interference.

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
