

Red Cross Schedule For October

In a letter addressed to the 460 Branches of Canadian Red Cross in Ontario, the President of Ontario Division, Mr. C. Bruce Hill declared, "It is true that as an emergency and disaster organization Red Cross rises to greatest heights in time of war but that does not relieve us of the responsibility to continue strong and active in time of peace. Red Cross finished the war high in the confidence of the world at large and our own people,

an asset of incalculable value. Let us be sure we do not dissipate it." "We in Red Cross must finish the war. Our workrooms must continue, for suffering abroad is desperate and the need is great. In the motherland it must be difficult for them to realize that peace is here."

"The Canadian Red Cross could be justly proud of its record in the alleviation of suffering and distress among those caught in the toils of the war just finished, but must put forth the same effort to remain strong and active in time of peace."

There was an exceptionally large turnout of candidates for initiation on Saturday evening and this growing volume of new members is a sure indication of the coming changes in the affairs of the Canadian Legion in general and Branch 88 in particular. President Al Wetmore stressed this change in his speech welcoming our young veterans into the fold.

Said Comrade Al: "The watchword of the Legion is service—service to the community you live in, and to your comrades, especially to those who through ill-health or other causes are no longer able to fend for themselves. The men of 1914 have shouldered these responsibilities, and the responsibilities that are part of the task of administering to the affairs of the Legion for many years; they have worked long and faithfully on the various committees that function solely for the purpose of carrying out the idea's of the Legion—and they are growing old."

"Next Wednesday, September 26th, is the night of our next general meeting and on that date nominations will be accepted for candidates who will be expected to run for office in the election for president and executive council for the year 1946. All you '39-ers should prepare for this by choosing men from out of the ranks of our young veterans and nominating them for election to any of these offices."

Comrades Jim Morgan and Tom Haley, President and Past President of the Matheson Branch, respectively, attended the initiation meeting and the entertainment that followed. Both comrades expressed themselves as being very much impressed with our initiation ceremony, also by the fact that we have four ladies—active members of the Branch.

Comrade Morgan has great hopes for the future of the Matheson Branch. The Branch at present consists of forty-five members, not at all bad for a town the size of Matheson. Comrade Haley, past president, was president of the Branch for 8 years, and these two comrades have worked hard to keep the Branch alive during the war. The Branch holds its general meeting on the 2nd Wednesday in every month and their nominations for executive officers in November. All returned men living in the vicinity of Matheson should make a point of visiting the Branch and making themselves known with a view to membership. Comrade Morgan issued a cordial invitation to all members of Branch 88 to visit their Branch at Matheson on Friday October 12th. He was very definite in his statement that there will be nothing lacking in the way of hospitality. Branch 88 will arrange for transportation.

The entertainment following the initiation was in keeping with every function put on by the entertainment committee of Branch 88. Twenty Years Ago

So far as is known, the first silver wedding anniversary to be celebrated in Timmins was that of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Roberts, who observed their twenty fifth anniversary of their marriage on September 23rd, 1925. More than a hundred of their friends gathered at the Hollinger Hall and many tributes were paid. The assistance they had given in the formation of the Caledonian Society, their help in the progress of football and other sports, and their many interests in the town were touched on. "In point of residence they were among the oldest and in point of quality they were among the very best citizens of Timmins," said the report. Mr. and Mrs. Roberts were married in Glasgow.

The road between Timmins and South Porcupine is now complete and it is a fine stretch of road, the only fault that might be found with it is that it is a little too narrow for the ever increasing traffic. The road itself, however, is a credit to all concerned," said an Advance item of September, 1925.

The Porcupine Fair was a big success in 1925, at least from the standpoint of exhibitors, not by attendance, it was reported. Cold weather kept the crowd away but those who did attend were well rewarded. The two big buildings on the new fair grounds at the station at Porcupine were crowded with first class exhibits," said this item.

Jos. A. Bradette, independent Liberal candidate in the riding for the 1925 election, spoke at Timmins one Sunday evening in September and made a real impression on the Liberal voters. Geo. A. Smith, who had been a vice-president in the Liberal Association, accused the executive of using unfair methods at the nomination meeting.

The Salvation Army band in Timmins was making good progress twenty years ago, it was reported. There were eight members.

Mr. Whitcomb, a McMaster College student who assisted Rev. Mr. Morley Hall at the Baptist Church here during the summer of 1925, was the guest of honour at a farewell party at the church.

Harry Groom, an old timer of the North, died just twenty years ago. He had been a well known citizen of North Cobalt for many years and had been a councillor in the township of Bucke. His generous public service was recognized by the people of the district. He was sixty years of age.

Morphine was the subject of searches made in a Timmins drug store and doctor's office twenty years ago, police decided. Entrance was gained, to both places by break-in, and although there was opportunity to take cash and valuables in both cases, only morphine tablets were disturbed.

The Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade met in Cochrane twenty years ago this week and elected the entire directorate with Alec Dewar of Iroquois Falls as president. Smith Ballantyne of Kapuskasing was the main speaker of the convention and his address on the farming possibilities of the North was so interesting and informative that it was later published in pamphlet form for distribution. Timmins delegates were P. M. Wallingford and G. A. Macdonald.

In 1925 Chinese restaurants agreed not to employ white girls in their establishments after 11 o'clock at night, it was reported. Council had threatened to pass a by-law making the employment of white girls in Chinese restaurants prohibited.

The marriage of John W. Wallace, manager in 1925, of the Timmins branch of the Bank of Montreal, took place in Temiskaming in September, to Miss Margaret Alleen Cowper, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Cowper.

The body of John McGrath, of Iroquois Falls, who was drowned when he fell from a canoe at Fredericks-house lake twenty years ago, was recovered after a long search.

While going into the Hollinger Hall, Mrs. A. Roberts had the misfortune to fall on the narrow steps, breaking her wrist in two places," said an Advance item twenty years ago. "The accident was a particularly regrettable one, the silver wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Roberts being celebrated during the evening at the Hollinger Hall."

"She has been one of the most faithful workers, having joined in 1939 and worked steadily ever since as a Conventor" she says.

A special Red Cross pin was given her from the President, which the guest of honour will, we know, wear with pride.

While saying 'Au revoir' to Mrs. Laforest, it will not be good-bye. Her roots are in this town and it will be hard for her to part with old friends. But we shall all look forward to seeing her many times in the future, when we shall welcome her again to South Porcupine, as the old lunge of the North will draw her back to visit us.

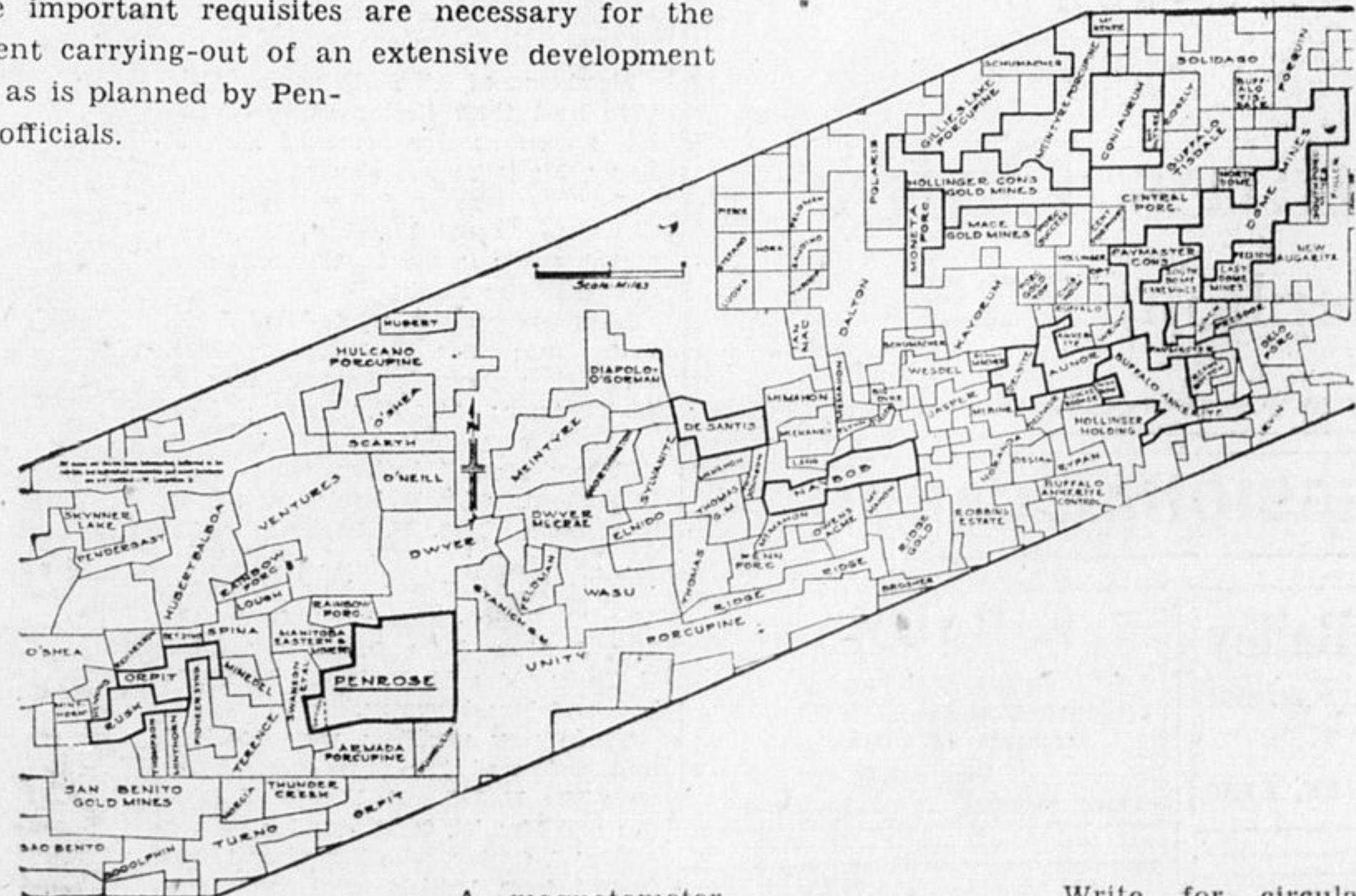
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New geological conceptions, new technical developments in the field of prospecting and ore locating are opening up the entire southwest section of Porcupine as indicated in this map area.
