THE LEGION COLUMN

President Al Wetmore delivered his report on behalf of himself and the executive committee on the result of the Legion's negotiations with the Hollinger management with regard to the subject of acquiring a lot on the highway for the purpose of erecting a new Legion Hall, during the General Meeting held on Wednesday, September 26th. The report was received with unanimous acclaim as might have been expected. The terms offered by the Hollinger were extremely favourable and the site obtainable, with all the advantages that go with it, has everything to recommend it.

So Comrades—Branch 88 is definitely committed to its new building program, and as soon as the services of a suitable architect can be retained construction will start without loss of time. If we act on the advice of the building committee, material should be in place ready for an early start next Spring.

During the reports on committee activities during the General Meeting Comrade Morris was appointed to the Scout Committee as an additional member. A publicity committee was created, consisting of Comrades P. J. Dunlop, Branch secretary, J. H. Knell and Norman Greene one of our new veterans.

In presenting Comrade Les Nicholson with his past-president's medal, President Al said, speaking on behalf of the Branch, that Comrade Nicholson had been with us since 1936 and had been an active worker from the start. Les had entered into every phase of the Legion and had worked right down through the years. Les had carried out a fine job of work while president of the Branch.

Comrade Les—in reply—paid tribute to the support and co-operation of the executive committee and all other committees during his term of office, and addressing the new veterans—said that although they were no longer on active service they were members of the Canadian Legion, and they still owed a duty to their less fortunate comrades, no less than when they were on Active Service.

The Legion Medal of Merit, awarded to Comrade P. Curtis for his services to the Branch, will be forwarded to England for presentation by his local Branch. Comrade Curtis left to take up permanent residence in England a few weeks ago and unfortunately the medal was received too late for presentation by Branch 88, for which he had worked long and faithfully.

It is intended that there will be at least two members from Schumacher included in this building panel. Further nominations for president of the Branch and Legion executive committee will be received at the two consecutive general meetings held in October and November.

The entertainment committee have arranged a crib tournament: Veterans of 1914's, V39-ers, to be held in the Legion Hall on Friday, October 5th. There will be lots of fun and no entry fee. 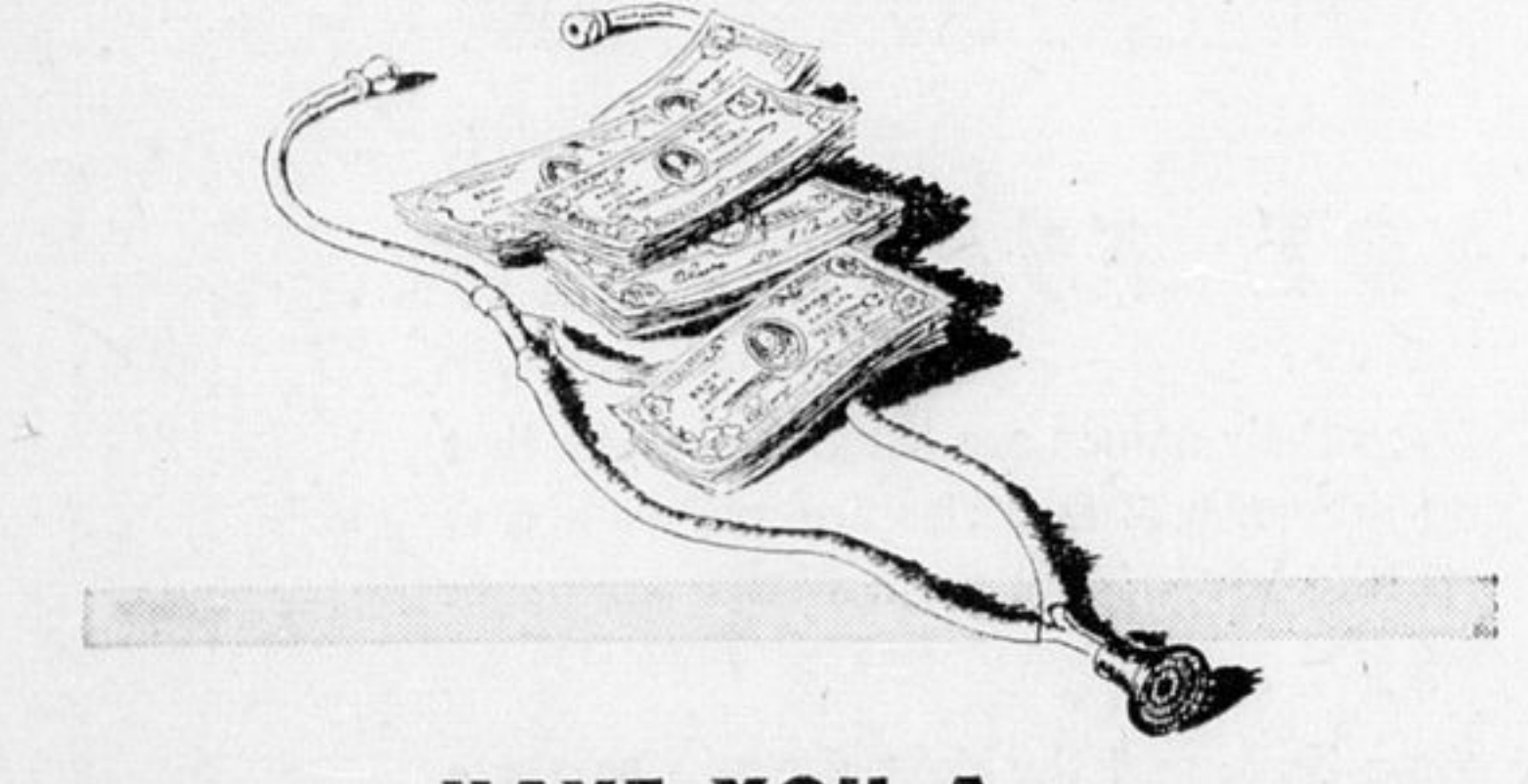
