So. Porcupine United Church Celebrates 34th Anniversary

South Porcupine, Oct. 24th. Special to The Advance.

The 34th Anniversary of the establishment of the United Church in South Porcupine was celebrated on Sunday last by special services in the Church at which Rev. A. P. Addison, B.A., of Halleybury preached both sermons.

In the morning his text was: "For their sakes I consecrate myself". The Junior Choir sang, "Song of Hope and Peace", with Geraldine Vickers taking the solo parts, and a duet was rendered by Joan Legary and Margaret Whitton—"Dear Lord, forgive".
