VETERANS HOUSING REGISTRY

The Municipal Council has arranged for the registration of available living accommodation for returned veterans and workers in essential industry.

Person having houses, apartments, or rooms for rent may list them with Mr. A. J. Van Rassel at the Municipal Building.

Returned Service personnel or returned war workers will be directed to available housing.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF TIMMINS

I, Arthur Llewellyn Shaw, do hereby certify that the following is a true copy of a proposed by-law of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins, namely:

"TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW NUMBER 896

BEING A BY-LAW to authorize the construction of a municipal garage and workshop in the Town of Timmins.

WHEREAS the Corporation is the owner of the land described as follows:—Part of the northeast quarter of the north half of lot 12, Concession 1, Tisdale, registered in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane as parcels 6687 and 6688 in the register for Whitney and Tisdale.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient that a municipal garage and workshop be constructed thereon at the expense of the Corporation at large.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED AS A BY-LAW of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins as follows:

1. A municipal garage and workshop shall be constructed on the above described property at the expense of the Corporation at large.
2. The Mayor and the Clerk of the Corporation may with the approval of the Council be declared by resolution engage the services of a qualified architect who shall forthwith make such plans, profiles and specifications and furnish such information as may be necessary for the making of a contract for the execution of the work.
3. The whole cost of the work shall not exceed the sum of \$75,000.00.
4. The work shall be carried on and executed under the superintendence and direction of the Engineer of the Corporation.
5. The Mayor and Clerk of the Corporation are hereby authorized to enter into a contract on behalf of the Corporation for the construction of the said work with some person, firm or corporation approved by the Council of the Corporation to be declared by resolution.
6. The Treasurer may (subject to the approval of the Council) agree with the Bank of the Corporation for temporary advances of money to meet the costs of the work pending the completion hereof.
7. The amount of the whole rateable property of the Corporation according to the last revised assessment roll was \$12,922,775.
8. The amount of the debenture debt of the Corporation is \$655,319.80 and no part of the principal or interest thereon is in arrears.
9. The special assessment shall be paid by ten annual instalments and the debentures to be issued for the loan to be effected to pay for the cost of the work when completed shall bear interest at three per cent per annum or at such other rate as may be decided upon by the Council and shall be made payable as provided in the Municipal Act and amendments thereto.

If the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed by-law it will be taken into consideration by the Council after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication.

The tenth day of December, 1945 at three o'clock in the afternoon at the office of the Town of Timmins in the Municipal Building in Timmins has been appointed by the Council as the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk.

The votes will be taken at the annual election of members of the Council.

The date of the first publication of this notice is the tenth day of November, 1945.
