

# Bisons Take 5-3 Win From Dome Porkies In Wednesday's Hockey

## Beausiegle Stars With Three of Bison's Goals In Well-Played Game

Local hockey fans attending the tilt on the McIntyre cushion Wednesday night saw the Ankerite Bisons send the Dome Porkies down to a 5-3 defeat in a fairly well-played game of hockey.

Don Beausiegle made off with three of the Bison tallies. Nastasuk, Maki and Sicoli took one each of the Dome trio.

The opening session failed to bring about any score, settling for three penalties. In the second frame, however, Ankerite rang up 4 to the Dome's 2.

Another pair of scores flashed up on the markers in the deciding stanza, spelling out the Dome defeat with the score at 5-3.

In the initial period the boys waited until around the ten-minute mark to find their feet and settle down to the problem.

The Porkies were the first to make the move in the form of an all-out siege on the Bison basket but without pleasing the electrical wizard.

Tomori, along with his bosom chum, Brownlee, was subjected to the hall of rubber and turned away the barrage in starring style. Three penalties, going to Capyk and Dunn of the Dome squad, and Patton of the Bisons marked the sheet for the time keepers.

Six goals in all became the result of the fast-moving second frame and only through continual refusal to smile on the part of lady luck, and the work of the net-minder, was the scoring kept down to the six.

Ankerite opened the scoring with the work of Shultz at 5:17 on assistance from Robinson and Clouthier. Dome retaliated almost immediately as Nastasuk batted the disc in. Bison mesh at 5:57 on an assist by Tallentino.

Beausiegle, Morris and Hepworth then teamed up for the second Ankerite success at 8:42 with Beausiegle administering the coupe de grace.

Beausiegle then capped his second tally of the evening at 12:28 with the help of Barney Morris. Dome sweeping back for an honor at 15:30 with Maki scoring on an assist by Kosick.

The most colorful of the Bison's tallies was the work of defenceman Roy Hawkey, who banged the biscuit in behind Tomori at 19:59 after weaving his way through practically the whole Dome team.

Both teams played their parts well in a heavy-checking slightly on the rough side finale to a good game.

Dome knocked off their final tally at 11:37 with Sicoli doing the scoring on an assist from Tallentino and at 17:05 Beausiegle chalked up the fifth Bison tally and his third score for the night.
