Hello Homemakers! Starting the New Year with good resolutions is often like admiring a jar full of cookies put on the kitchen table about three-thirty in the afternoon. Fifteen minutes later the children have been in from school, changed their clothes, helped themselves to a cookie or two or three, and then gone out to play. The jar of cookies which you thought would last all week, has been completely emptied!

If you weaken for a day, we trust that your resolutions will be reconsidered, just as the cookie jar has been refilled.

TAKE A TIP
The Homemaker's resolution:
1. Plan meals around the daily essentials—1 serving meat or fish or eggs, 2 servings of vegetables, 1 citrus fruit or tomato juice, 4 slices of whole wheat bread or whole grain cereals, 1 pint of milk or 2 servings cheese and a pat of butter.

2. Acquire the habit of using desirable working procedures.
3. Check on purchases within the family income.
4. Apply nutritive cooking methods for every meal.
5. Develop new serving ideas as well as attain standard products.
6. Show the ability to set an attractive table.
7. Entertain friends simply with ease and pleasure.

THE SUGGESTION BOX
During a recent visit to northern Ontario, we exchanged recipes with homemakers who have a high reputation for delicious food. From time to time we are publishing their "pet" recipes. Here are a few:

FUDGE CAKE (Mrs. D.G. S.)
2 pkgs. salted peanuts, 1 can sweetened condensed milk, 2 cups crushed graham crackers or vanilla wafers, 2 sqs. unsweetened chocolate.
Melt chocolate in double boiler. Add milk and blend. Stir in cracker crumbs. Crush peanuts, spread half in bottom of greased pan, pour on the partially cooked chocolate mixture and press down. Spread remaining nuts on top. Chill to set.

DARK GUMDROP CAKE (Mrs. L. M. K.)
2 eggs well beaten, 1 cup granulated sugar, 1 cup butter or shortening, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 lb. gumdrops, cut with scissors, 1 cup sweetened apple sauce (thick), 2 cups all-purpose flour, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 1/2 lb. Sultana raisins (boiled 5 mins. in enough water to cover, drain and cool); 1 tsp. soda, dissolved in 1/2 cup boiling water.
Mix sugar, butter, add well beaten eggs, salt, cinnamon and thick apple-sauce, half the flour and drained raisins. Add gumdrops to rest of flour and add to batter. Stir in soda and hot water last. Cook in a covered casserole for 2 hrs. at 275-300 degs. Remove cover last 5 mins. to brown top.

BRAN MUFFINS (Mrs. W. M.)
2 heaping tbs. shortening, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1 egg, 1 cup milk (Prepared dry milk or whole milk), 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup prepared bran cereal, 1 cup flour, 2 1/2 tps. baking powder.

Pork Is Scarce, But Beans are Scarcer, WPTB Now States

Pork and Beans Ouput Curtailed
The time was when people used to complain about the small amount of pork in pork and beans. Now, the beans themselves are scarce, Wartime Prices and Trade Board states, and unless special authorization is obtained from the Board no one can pack for sale within Canada, during any 12-month period, more than 50% of the quantity of canned beans packed during 1941.

The Price Board says that the short supply of dried beans is the reason behind the curtailing of output for domestic use, as well as the fact that certain essential needs have to be met first.

The "canned beans" order refers to dried beans processed and packed in metal containers whether with or without pork, tomato sauce, or anything else. In short, any and all kinds of beans are included in the order. Previously, the production of canned beans was restricted by limitations in the amount of tin available for canning. This restriction has now been lifted but the continuing shortage of beans makes control of them necessary.

It is understood she likes Canada and expects to be very happy here. Up to the present she has found no time to be homesick, she says.

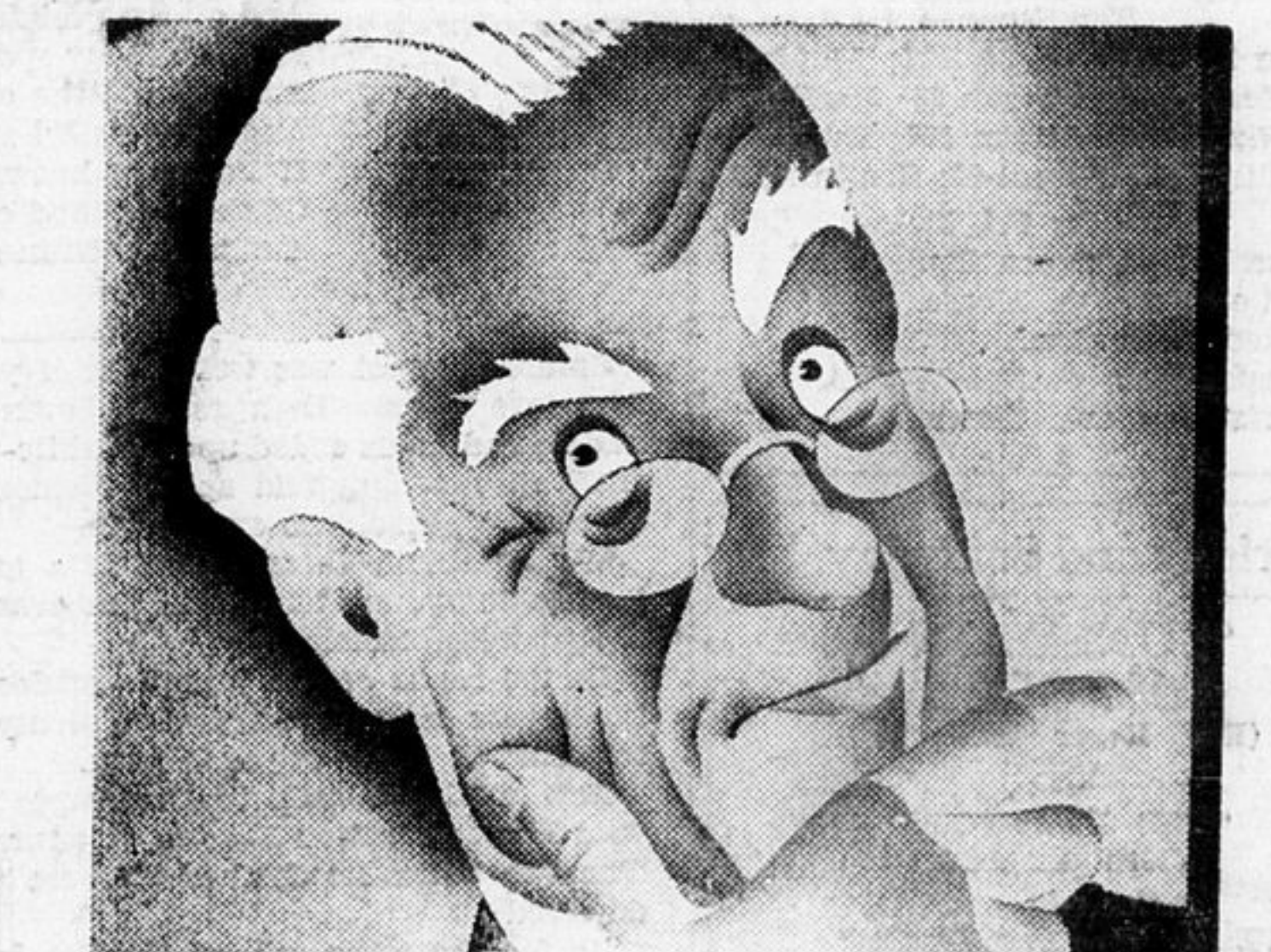
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
