

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Pork Is Scarce, But Beans are Scarcer. **WPTB Now States**

Pork and Beans Ouptut Curtailed The time was when people us to complain about the small amour of pork in pork and beans. Now, the beans themselves are scarce, Wartime Prices and Trade Board states, and unless special authorization is obtained Plans Made For Sleigh from the Board no one can pack for sale within Canada, during any 12month period, more than 50% of the quantity of canned beans packed during 1941. The Price Board says that the short supply of dried beans is the reason

behind the curtailing of output for domestic use, as well as the fact that certain essential needs have to be met first.

The "canned beans" order refers to dried beans processed and packed in metal containers whether with or without pork, tomato sauce, or anything else. In short, any and all kinds of beans are included in the order Previously, the production of canned beans was restricted by limitations in the amount of tin available for canning. This restriction has now been lifted but the continuing shortage of beans makes control of them necessary


