Child Suffocated When South Porcupine Home Is Gutted By Blaze

Neighbours Rally To Aid Family In Loss of Home, Wellknown Resident Furniture and Clothing

The first death in a South Porcupine fire since 1911 occurred on Monday, when Billy six-months old baby of Mr and Mrs. V. Lammi, of 67 Crawford St., was suffocated by fumes and smoke when fire gutted their home.

Mrs. Lammi was preparing food in the kitchen of the house when neighbours saw smoke and flame coming through the roof around 11 a.m. Notifying the family to get out, say

rushed up to the second floor where the baby was sleeping, only to find that the fire had gained such headway that entrance to the bedroom was made impossible by the choking fumes and smoke.

By this time the alarm had been given and seventeen firemen were on but knowing that the baby could no! possibly be saved, did all they could to save the building.

Mike Cybulski got into the room and found the baby, wrapped it in blanket, and gave it into the hands of Dr. Atkinson who had been notified and who was waiting to do anything that might be done to save
