

Anglican Diocese Of Moosonee Will Launch Appeal For Funds

"The Church of England in Canada, is keeping with the spirit of the mother church in England and with the spirit that is manifesting itself in all branches of the Anglican communion in the world, is embarking upon another venture of faith, as it has on so many occasions before," Rev. J. S. Ford, rector of St. Paul's Anglican church stated this week.

"This time it is known as The Anglican Advance Appeal for Red-Dedication and Thank-offering. The Anglican Diocese of Moosonee has pledged itself to raise at least \$17,500," the rector said. "This is in itself an adventure of faith, as there is already in this Diocese a general program of faith, as there is already in this Diocese a general program involving the expenditure of \$50,000 on Indian Missions, and in nearly every white Parish there are plans being carried out for improvements to properties, higher salaries to clergy, and measures to increase efficiency throughout both self-supporting and assisted parishes, together with the appointment of extra

clergy," he continued.

"With these things in mind the budget committee of the Diocese of Moosonee met on Monday of last week. Their meeting was marked by several resolutions that were presented to the executive of Synod the following day. On Wednesday all members of the executive were invited to a third meeting in Iroquois Falls at which the very Rev. Dean Waterman of the Diocese of Niagara was the speaker.

"As the official representative of the Anglican Advance Movement he presented the needs of the Church in Canada. Following his most informative message, which was followed by a discussion period, all present were the guests at lunch of Rt. Rev. and Mrs. Renison of the Bishop's Residence."

High School Students See Inaugural Meeting Of Tisdale Councillors

Present By Invitation, The Second & Third-Formers See How Council Operates

Something new and it is thought, an excellent idea, was introduced on Monday morning when the new council took place the inaugural oath of office and held its first meeting.

About fifty of the high school students, second and third-formers, were present by invitation to see the procedure and take a lesson, first hand, in "Civics".

They were interested in the whole proceeding judging by the attention given, and when Don Sutherland, acting as spokesman for the audience, thanked the Township Clerk for the invitation, and the Reeve and council for the courtesy extended, he did it with ease and poise.

They gave marked attention when the councillors swore they "would not receive any payment or reward or promise thereof for the exercise of any partially or malversation, or other undue execution of the said office, and that they had not by themselves or partners either directly or indirectly, any interest in any contract with, or on behalf of, the said corporation."

Reeve V. H. Evans extended a word of welcome to the students before making his inaugural speech. He commented on the fact that the same council would work together with him in the coming year and hoped for co-operation as in the past, and to achieve good results.

Peace problems will occupy first place in the consideration of the council, he said. Re-establishment and rehabilitation of veterans and acknowledgment of the service local veterans have rendered.

Waterworks for Schumacher and paving of streets, etc., will be taken up in the new year, he stated, and plans will be discussed for recreational centers, swimming pools, etc., in both sections. Sewage disposal and other improvements will also receive consideration, the Reeve promised.

A routine council meeting followed.

The Kiwanis Club of South Porcupine sent an invitation to a dinner meeting on the same evening (Monday) to the Reeve and council in their official capacity.

From the United Church of Canada a letter of appreciation for tax reduction was received. The Reeve explained for the benefit of youth present that assessment of church property and tax notices are sent out as to lay holders, but when cheque for the same is received a gift to the church is sent by Council.

Squadron Leader W. C. Pierce "E" Flight Commander, Porcupine Squadron, wrote a letter of appreciation for many gifts sent by the municipality to the squadron.

A meeting of the South Temiskaming Municipal Association, is to be held on Tuesday in the New Liskeard Public Library, invitation to which was read to council.

B. Edmondson, leader of the Boy's Craft-Club, wrote expressing his appreciation for past grants from the council, and requested some assistance in 1946. He mentioned that this club is growing, its membership now being 122, and that electrical work and other crafts are being taught as well as home nursing for girls, which is most popular. This request will receive consideration.

A noticeable smile was noticed when the council appointed W. C. Boyd as weed inspector at a salary of \$10 per year. The Reeve explained that the duties were not onerous.

Dr. W. M. McLaren was appointed Indigent's doctor for 1946.

Wages, accounts, etc., were passed for payment and the appointment of a member to the high school board to replace Mr. Gus McManus, was held over for consideration.

TOWN OF TIMMINS 1946 Taxes Pre Payment Discount

On and after January 2nd, 1946, the Town of Timmins will accept advance payments to apply on 1946 taxes, and will allow a discount at the rate of approximately 3 1/2% per annum to due date. Such prepayments, in any amount, will be accepted until May 15th, 1946.

Due dates for payment of 1946 taxes are as follows:
 First Instalment 50% : due May 31, 1946
 Second Instalment 50% : due September 6, 1946.
 4% Penalty will be added to unpaid balance after due date.

In addition, a further discount of 1% will be allowed on amount of second instalment if 1946 taxes are paid in full on or before May 31, 1946.

No discount will be allowed on over-payment of taxes. Prepayment of taxes is a means of saving to the taxpayer who takes advantage of it and is also of assistance to your municipality in maintaining its financial position. Your co-operation is requested to make the plan as successful as in the past.
