Miss F. MacDonald Is First Teacher To Have 25 Years' Service Here

On Friday night, Miss Flora MacDonald, principal of Moneta School, was guest of honour at a banquet in the Grand Hotel, in celebration of her 25th anniversary as a teacher in Timmins.

Miss MacDonald has the distinction of being the first teacher here, to reach this 25-year mark, and her many friends present did much to make this banquet a memorable occasion. She came to Timmins from Cobalt in 1916, and for two or three months taught in an improvised classroom in the basement of the Anglican church and later in the basement of the Miners' Union Hall.

When the first part of Central School was completed, Miss MacDonald taught there until 1918, when she left for Alberta to qualify for a certificate in the province. In 1923 she returned to Timmins and to teaching in an annex opposite Mattagami Public School, and from there she and her class moved to Vimy School. Miss MacDonald was principal at that school until September 1923, and in November 1924, became principal of Moneta Public School, a position she has held since.

At the banquet Friday night, Mr. Ross Battie, principal of Mattagami School, proposed a toast, and spoke of the esteem in which Miss MacDonald is held, by her ex-pupils, and by the parents of her students, as well as of her ability as a principal.
