Hen House Burns; No Roast Chicken For Sunday Dinner

From Thursday, Jan. 31, to Monday, Feb. 4, the local fire department answered ten alarms. The first, received at 2:07 p.m. on Jan. 31 was to 121 Preston St. South where the furnace pipes had fallen, resulting in no damage other than the discomfort of the heavy smoke. The second and last call for Jan. 31 was turned in at 9:02 p.m. when a chimney fire had caused alarm to the occupants of a home at 86 Bannerman Avenue.

Four chimney fires marked the call sheet for Feb. 2, with fires occurring at 79 Middleton, 104 Wilson, 53 Commercial Ave., and at the Children's Shelter on Mountjoy St., none of which caused damage to the homes. The fifth call for the day brought firemen to a home at 123 Birch St. North where a plastic screwdriver, left under the stove element, after repairs had been made to same, ignited causing alarm. There was no damage.

On Sunday at 10:34 p.m. the department was summoned to 280 Riverside Drive where a hen house was burning. Damage from the fire was slight and it was found that the pipes in the structure were too close to the window frames and had thus started the fire. The owners had the blaze nearly controlled before the arrival of the fire department.

Completing the weekend fire calls were two chimney fires, one at 29 Middleton Ave., where overheated chimney and pipes had caused alarm and a chimney fire at 27 Montgomery.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW No. 903

BEING A BY-LAW to stop up part of a lane within the Corporation.

WHEREAS Timmins Garage Limited, the registered owner of lots numbers 841, 842, 843, and the south half of 839 according to Plan M-39 (Sudbury) now deposited in the office of Land Titles at Cochrane, has petitioned the Council to stop up part of the lane hereinafter described and to sell the surface rights thereof to it.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed desirable to do so.

AND WHEREAS Notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law and who have applied to be heard, have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED as a By-law of the Town of Timmins as follows.

1. The West ninety-four feet (94') of the Lane shown on Plan M-30 (Sudbury) now deposited in the office of Land Titles at Cochrane, the south boundary of which is the north boundary of Lots 841, 842, 843, and 844 according to the said plan and the north boundary of which is the south boundary of lots 838 and 845 according to the said plan is hereby closed and stopped up.

2. The surface rights of the part of the lane so closed and stopped up shall be transferred to the Timmins Garage Company Limited in exchange for a transfer to the Corporation of the north twelve (12') feet from front to rear of the south half of Lot 839 according to Plan M-30 (Sudbury) and the proper Officers of the Corporation are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver a transfer to the Timmins Garage Company Limited of the part of the lane so closed and stopped up.

3. IT IS HEREBY DECLARED that the land received by the Corporation from the Timmins Garage Company Limited, namely, the north twelve (12') feet from front to rear of the south half of Lot 839 according to Plan M-30 (Sudbury) is to be used as a lane and for that purpose is hereby opened and dedicated as a highway.

READ a first, second and third time and finally passed this day of 1946.

HENRY FRÉDERICK DAINTON

Funeral services were held on Monday afternoon at St. Matthew's Anglican church for Henry Frederick Dainton who died Friday morning, in St. Mary's hospital.

Born in Bath, England, 62 years ago, he came to Canada when 25 years of age, taking up residence in Cobalt. After a period of five years there, Mr. Dainton came to Timmins to live at 45 Riverside Drive. He had been in ill health for nearly twelve months, being seriously ill for a period of three weeks prior to his death.

Surviving are his widow and son Richard, now in Timmins, and relatives in England.

Mr. Dainton was interred in the South Porcupine cemetery. Funeral arrangements were by Walkers Funeral Home.

High School Pupils Defeat Schumacher In Friday Debate

The T. H. and V. S. debating team defeated a team from Schumacher high school in a debate held in the T. H. and V. S. auditorium last Friday evening. The subject of the debate was, "Resolved that Canada should adopt large scale European immigration after Canadian veterans have been rehabilitated." Timmins defeated the negative side.

Shirley Kyle opened the debate for the affirmative with the argument that Canada had plenty of arable land, and that there were too many people in Europe. Miss Kyle gave an example of modern immigration in Australia. She stressed the hard working North European peoples especially, and their contribution to Canada's development. "Scandinavia needs her own people to develop their countries," Robert Millette stated, on behalf of the negative, "How is the Canadian government going to supply jobs to immigrants when it is not sure all Canadian vets are going to get jobs?"

He added that immigrants cause overcrowding when they flock to the cities during depression, and live at a very low standard. Barbara Hayworth replied for the affirmative stating that immigrants live in slums because they cannot improve conditions. "Most immigrants stay on the farms during depression, and second generation Canadians flock to the cities," Miss Hayworth continued, "immigrants have added much to Canadian culture."

"Canada has enough trouble rehabilitating her veterans," said Mabel Read, "there will be more trouble if immigrants come. Canada can prevent depression by keeping her population small."

Shirley Kyle asserted that the hard-working Europeans could open new areas, and that immigration should start after rehabilitation. Robert Millette refuted the statement that the more people in Canada, the more money would circulate. "Canada will pay out money in times of depression, and not gain it through taxes."

The debate was followed by a vocal solo by Yvonne Essa. Prizes were awarded to French students by Mr. Rose, principal of the school. Intermediate certificates were awarded to students.
