

# Green Shirts Outclass Combines To Win 5 to 0

## Green Shirts Get Shut-Out In Clean, Fair Game In Last Night's Fixture

### Four Goals Scored Without Assists; Johnson Gets Two Tallies

Hollinger Green Shirts moved through three periods of well-played hockey to take the Porcupine Combines for a 5-0 win at the McIntyre arena last night.

Outclassed by the smart Hollinger squad, the Combines nevertheless played good, clean hockey, worked hard and showed that they were capable of putting up a straight and clean complexioned tangle, as summarized by the complete lack of penalties for the game.

Petrucchi was kept clear of obtaining the needed points and Bunny Mangotich pulled down a shut-out to bring him into the shut-out bracket with Lyola Porter who also sports a single record of thwarting the twine cuddlers. Johnson and Telkinen broke the scoring ice with Johnson taking an unassisted marker in the opening moments. Telkinen also chalked up unassisted honours as he pocketed off bouncing puck that came in on a side-on shot to move over Sciolli's stick and settle in the basket.

Scoring was completely out of the picture in the second frame as both teams played hard and with misses frequent and heartbreakers for both squads.

Going into the final frame with the same brand of rugged and clean hockey, Hollinger began a methodical marking of their remaining points with Baker popping the puck over Sciolli's head from a scramble at the two-minute mark. Not until almost three-quarters of the game had been left behind did Johnson manage to backhand an assist from McKay and Schwab into the basket. Johnson played flush to the post and took the pass on a "shouldn't of happened" affair.

The final marker of the evening was the fourth unassisted tally with Schwab taking it on a drive from the boards.

## Jerry Morin Cops Crown In North Bay Meet

### John Barry Shows Well As P. S. C. Entry

CONGRATULATIONS ARE IN ORDER for Jerry Morin, and John Barry two of the Porcupine Ski Club's entries in the Northern Ontario Championships held in North Bay over the weekend. Jerry copped the crowns for both the downhill and slalom events in the men's Class II, taking the top bracket of the slalom event by a five second margin over C. Edgar, a Laurentian entry, who finished second of the twenty-one participants in the fixture. Morin's time was 1 Min. 21.3 sec. in comparison to Edgar's time of 1 minute 26.6 sec. Jerry took the downhill crown with his time of 1 min. 18.1 sec. Moving ahead of D. Demeza, another Laurentian entry, by four seconds.

Adding extra glitters to the crowns are the facts that this was Jerry's first attempt in his class, having just left the Junior ranks, and that he has just recently been discharged from the Navy.

John Barry, entering the men's downhill, Class I, made a good showing against the 32 other participants in the event by moving in at seventh place. Barry is also a recent dischargee and this was his first attempt in the higher brackets, having just left the junior sections.

SKIING IS HEADING FOR THE TOP RUNGS and is fast becoming one of the biggest and best of the growing sports in Canada. More and more people are becoming interested in a sport that is one of the best forms of recreation and also one of the most beneficial to good health.

Skiing is governed in Canada by the Canadian Amateur Skiing Association. In Ontario the Association is divided into two zones - Northern and Southern. The Northern Zone comprises of districts north of North Bay west to Sault Ste. Marie, and east to the Quebec border. Each year the Zones hold ski meets for their junior members of nineteen years of age and under and for this particular run of 365 incidents we find the ski meet will be held here in Timmins with the date as Feb. 23 and 24 - a little over a week away.

The Porcupine Ski Club have been seeking permission to hold same here for a number of years and have received permission to hold the Junior and Interscholastic meets for 1946.

The age limit is nineteen years and under for boys and girls working or going to school, to be entered in three groups, (A), 18 to 19; (B), 16 to 17; and (C), 15 and under, in four events - Jumping, Cross Country, Slalom and Downhill, with prizes for first and second in each event and each class.

Jumping has been omitted from the list of events for the coming meet due to the fact that there are no facilities here for it. The club is, however, planning the construction of a new jump as soon as the necessary funds can be raised. The hoped for realization is set as a possibility for next year.

In regard to the trophies for the events, it was learned that service clubs have taken a keen interest in the Club and have made donations of trophies. The Kiwanis Club of Sudbury have donated a trophy for the best team of schoolboys - two from each class, "A", "B" and "C" and the Lions Club of Timmins have donated a trophy for the crown-wearing schoolboy winner in Class "A". The trophy will be held by the school he represents and a replica will be the property of the winner. At present the Club hope that some of the other Service Clubs will be able to add to the trophies already open for the winning.

The coming meet will be held in the vicinity of the Chalet on Saturday and at Kamascotia on Sunday. Transportation to Kamascotia has been arranged for the entrants.

It is known that about sixty boys will be here for the meet, coming from North Bay, Sudbury, Kirkland Lake, New Liskeard, Noranda, Val'Dor, Iroquois Falls and other northern towns. And in order to defray the expense of hotel accommodation there is a need for billets for each competitor.

The club asks that any members able to accommodate one or more of the visitors or knowing of anyone able and willing to do so, contact any of the senior members.

The Porcupine Ski Club is and has been, working hard to make this meet an outstanding success. They deserve all the help and support that can be given them, now and in the future, for the work they are doing to further a great sport and provide a large amount of the recreational needs of the younger set in Timmins.

At present the membership of the club is about 300 and still growing.
