

GREEN SHIRTS ELIMINATED FROM PLAYOFFS

Crowd Watches Bisons Take Easy 12-5 Victory In Mines League Series

Allan and Morris Star In Scoring Efforts In Last Night's Hockey Game

Buffalo Ankerite Bisons took the two out of three series from the Hollinger Green Shirts with a swamp of 12-5 at the McIntyre arena last night. The Bisons will now go on to meet the winner of the Dome-McIntyre elimination to determine the crown collector of the Mines League.

Before a large crowd the two teams battled out a rugged and wide open tilt with the Bisons outclassing, out-playing the Hollinger machine and giving the fans a lovely exhibition of nearly perfect team work.

Hollinger started out strong, slumped and then came back in the third period to ring up of three tallies and provide the best opposition they had offered through the previous moments of the game.

Veterans Hughie Allan and Barney Morris, went on the bandwagon with Hughie knocking off nine points for his evening's work on five goals and four assists and Barney Morris holding his end up with seven points -- a single marker and six assists. Don Beausiegle he led himself to a brace of goals and assist and Jackie Ladds walked off with two markers and a lone assist.

Piling up Hollinger's five points were Orlando and Gordon with two goals apiece, McKay with a single tally, Telkinen with two assists and Schwab with a point for a helping hand.

Hollinger moved ahead to a short-lived 2-1 lead in the first period that held for a matter of about two minutes before the Ankerite machine retaliated and swept ahead on a scoring run in the first and second frames.

Body checks were handed out with a liberal lade with peace and quiet threatened in the opener, nothing coming of same, and in the closing period as Telkinen and Hawkey complimented each other and then with Hawkey taking the sashay to the splinter shack on a roughing charge.

Ankerite amassed their total through smart passing plays, corner shots and knee-high drives from distance out. Orlando ledged the prettiest looking Hollytie blinker as he took Telkinen's assist at the three-quarter mark of the final period, while standing to the side of Brownlee's ward, juggled the puck for a moment and calmly flipped it over the net-sentinel's head as the Bisons swarmed around him.

Bisons Take First Of Semi-Final Playoffs In Fan-Pleasing Hockey

Six-Periods Needed To Provide Decision In Hard-Fought Game On Monday

By virtue of a scoring spree staged in the third period of overtime play, the Buffalo Ankerite Bisons took an 11-8 decision over the Hollinger Green Shirts in the first of their semi-final playoffs at the McIntyre on Monday night.

Overcoming the short end of a 5-2 total at the end of the second period, the Buffalo Ankerite Bisons moved through a hard-fought final stanza, to tie the game at 6-6, with Beausiegle, working on the assists of Ladds and Patton, sinking the tying goal.

From there on the teams battled out two no-scoring overtime sessions. In the third of these, the Bisons piled up four tallies in nearly as many minutes. Hollinger added a brace to their aggregate and Bisons capped their fifth, to bring the final score up to 11-8.

From the opening whistle, both squads played hard and fast to give the fans the best game of hockey to date, and Hollinger moved gradually up the scoring ladder with Orlando copping the two Green Shirt tallies in the opener on assists of Pontello and McKay. Sammy Casanato rang up the sole first period marker for the Bisons, Beausiegle helping.

Johnson and Baker gave the Hollinger it's starting goal in the second period with Johnson standing flush with the basket to take Baker's assist standing still and flipping it in.

Following up, Telkinen, pulled off an unassisted stunt at the ten-minute mark to keep Hollinger in the lead. Couthier broke the run shortly after and in the closing moments of the frame Bunny Gordon cut into the Bisons basket, took McKay's assist and drove in one of the loveliest tallies of the night.

The final session was a complete turn-about, with the Bisons slowly coming from behind until they had the game tied at 5-5. Theriault and Orlando united it and in the last moments Beausiegle romped in with Ladds and Patton to get a scramble going around Mangotich's net with the red light showing on Beausiegle's efforts.

The first of the three overtime session failed to bring a change in scene as the two machines kept up the all-out play that marked the previous periods. The second was of the same calibre, with little if any signs of fatigue being shown by either squad.

Going into the third overtime session, the Bisons put on an extra burst to rap in four markers to the Hollies one. Theriault, Orlando and Pontello, broke the Bison run at the five-minute mark, and Orlando at the seven-minute as Hollinger pressed hard in an attempt to mark right the tables again.

Veteran Barney Morris followed up on the Holly marker, at the six-minute mark, taking unassisted honours on a tally made as Mangotich sprawled onto the cushion in an attempt to save. Orlando followed for the final goal of the evening, as Ankerite clinched the first game of a best-of-three series.
