

# McIntyre Takes Mine League Hockey Title

## Defeat Ankerite By 6-3 In Fine Exhibition Of Hockey Wednesday Night

### Delmonte, Wilson Shine For Macmen, Scoring Two Goals Apiece

McIntyre came forth as the victor on a 6-3 win over Ankerite at the McIntyre arena last night to tuck the Mines League championship under their belts and qualify for a meeting in Sudbury for the N.O.H.A. title.

The cards were shuffled and dealt before a capacity crowd that saw the pecking begin in the second game of a best-of-three finals. An all-round great game took place with an exhibition of some of the fastest hockey of the season being expended in the game's opening moments.

McIntyre nosed ahead in the opening period as both teams went all out. Joe Iannarelli, McIntyre's starring defenceman, lodged the initial score with a backhand from the blue line that sent the disc driving through a maze of legs. The puck caught Brownlee's stick, bounced over and idled up to scoring position.

The second of the Macmen's first period tallies came on an assisted basis as Wink Wilson lobbed a long one as he moved along the boards into Bison ground. Morgan assisted on the marker that blinked the light as Bison defence lapsed.

With Boyce and Wilson ringing up markers during the first half of the second, the McIntyre squad played untouched with Porter contributing greatly to holding off Ankerite attempts.

Ladds and Morris, with Hepworth and Hawkey helping, Morris started the Bison's scoring. Ladds made his mark on a blind shot from the boards with Morris making full use of a scramble session to blink the light on his attempt.

In the rugged second frame, both net sentinels took many a siege. Both of the McIntyre tallies beat Brownlee on height, landing in the mesh under the crosspiece with Porter falling on corner pickers.

The final stanza came in with Delmonte and Gustavson going all-out on a breakaway. Delmonte's drive at Brownlee squeezed through the net minder's legs to add another notch to the scoring stick at the seven-minute mark.

Hughie Allan followed moments later to bat at the disc and lift it over a squatting Porter as a lengthy scramble worried the boxed-in squad.

The final flashing of the bulb came at the six-minute mark with Delmonte taking his second goal of the night; on an assist by Tomiuk. With Brownlee pulled out from the mesh affording an open basket, Boyce, Tomiuk and Delmonte stabbed at the problem in turn until Delmonte's shot from the corner did the trick.

Shining lights for the game were Delmonte, and Wilson for McIntyre and Morris, Allan and Beausiegle for the lesers.

Out of the tilt came but two occupants for the punishment palace with

Ladds and Iannarelli winding up with majors for a tangle in the closing moments of the second period.
