NOTICE

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins to pass the following by-law after due notice thereof has been published in accordance with the Provisions of the Municipal Act.

TOWN OF TIMMINS BY-LAW No. 903

BEING A BY-LAW to stop up part of a lane within the Corporation.

WHEREAS Timmins Garage Limited, the registered owner of lots numbers 841, 842, 843 840 and the south half of 839 according to Plan M-30 (Sudbury) now deposited in the office of Land Titles at Cochrane, has petitioned the Council to stop up part of the lane hereinafter described and to sell the surface rights thereof to it.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed desirable to do so.

AND WHEREAS Notice of the intention of the Council has been duly advertised as required by the Municipal Act and all persons who claim that their land will be prejudicially affected by the By-law and who have applied to be heard, have been heard by the Council.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED as By-law of the Town of Timmins as follows.

1. The West ninety-four feet ('94") of the Lane shown on Plan M-30 (Sudbury) now deposited in the office of Land Titles at Cochrane, the south boundary of which is the north Boundary of lots 841, 842, 843, 844 and 845 according to the said plan and the north boundary of which is the south boundary of lots 840 and 846 according to the said plan is hereby closed and stopped up.

2. The surface rights of the part of the lane so closed and stopped up shall be transferred to the Timmins Garage Company Limited in exchange for transfer to the Corporation of the north twelve (12') feet from front to rear of the south half of Lot 839 according to Plan M-30 (Sudbury) and the proper Officers of the Corporation are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver a transfer to the Timmins Garage Company Limited of the part of the lane so closed and stopped up.

3. IT IS HEREBY DECLARED that the land received by the Corporation from the Timmins Garage Company Limited, namely, the north twelve (12') feet from front to rear of the south half of Lot 839 according to Plan M-30 (Sudbury) is to be used as a lane and for that purpose is hereby opened and dedicated as a highway.

READ a first, second and third time and finally passed this day of 1946.

Briefly, Mr. Rinn asked the branch to assist him in this purpose by establishing a reliable contact over there so that the shoes could be distributed among those who needed them most.

The branch immediately contacted Comrade Fred Curtis. Comrade Curtis was at one time a member of the executive committee of Branch 88 and a faithful member from the time that the branch was originated. Fred now resides at Cardiff, Wales, and he referred the question to the branch with which he has since affiliated -- to Rummy and St. Mellons Branch British Legion, Rumney, Cardiff. We have since received the following letter, from the British Legion house in Cardiff.

"Your letter of Nov. 26, to Mr. Fred Curtis was passed on to our Rumney and St. Mellons Branches of the British Legion and they have asked us to communicate with you regarding your very fine offer of 75 pairs of ladies' shoes. I can assure you that the branch appreciates this very much. It is a first-class unit. We have 360 branches in Wales and we regard Rumney as one of the best.

"We therefore forward to you a letter received from the Customs and Excise asking if you will forward these to us. If you send a copy of the bill of lading to us everything will be handled properly.

"We wish you well in Canada and can assure you that ex-servicemen in this country are doing very well. I am enclosing the British Legion Journal for the month of January, which will give you some idea of what we are doing."

Under the same cover we received a copy of the British Legion Journal and the following enclosure from the Collector of Customs, Cardiff.

"In reply to your letter of the 24th instant I have to inform you what your head office is authorized through the 'British Legion Comfort Fund' to import, free of duty, gifts from abroad addressed to your organization.

It is therefore suggested that you communicate with your headquarters with a view to their making the necessary arrangements."
