## Ceiling Prices Up On Jams And Jellies

Since the 1st of March, subsidy payment to manufacturers on sales of jams and jellies has been discontinued, Wartime Prices and Trade Board has announced.

Ceiling prices have been adjusted an amount equivalent to the subsidy. As a result, consumers will pay approximately 4 cents more for a standard

2-pound (24 fluid ounces) jar or an equivalent amount according to the variety, grade and size of the container. The jump in price will naturally not go into effect until stocks effected by the subsidy removal reach retailers' shelves. The jam subsidy has been in effect since June 1943.

Commenting on the above Mrs. E. L. Urquhart pointed out that it was simply a matter, so far as the public were concerned, of paying more for the jam directly instead of by tax money which had supported the government subsidy.

"A lot of people have the idea that now the rationing is being changed, or that their coupons will be discontinued," Mrs. Urquhart stated. "This is not so."

There will be no change in the rationing so far as jams and jellies are concerned, but the price will increase slightly when present stocks, purchased while the subsidy was in effect, are exhausted.
