Legion War Services To End In June

Capt. John Gore, M. C. London, in charge of war services for District No. 1, told the members at the District "H" convention that all Legion War Services would end on June 30.

Captain Gore explained that the services were slated to end on Mar. 31 but due to needs of the Army this move was not made. Services to the Navy and R. C. A. F. were closed however.

The work being done by the C.W.L.S. was highly regarded by both military headquarters and the public, he said. As for the furniture used by the C.W.L.S. Capt. Gore stated "the Legion would be given direct preference in obtaining the goods but that nothing could be sold without the direct approval of the National War Services."

"Most of the furniture was to go to hospitals primarily and to permanent camps," he stated.

Capt. Gore voiced skepticism in speaking of his feelings when the C.W.L.S. was formed and set up their educational services but stated that everything had worked out to perfection. In the light of this he voiced the opinion that there should be no timidity in setting up service bureaus, pointing out that such would be of tremendous importance, not so much at the present time but in about ten years time when they would become a great necessity.
