These were make-shift electrical equipment, stoves too close to walls, carelessness with cleaning fluids, lighting papers with gasoline or coal oil, leaving papers and rubbish in basements, carelessness with cleaning or painting rags, allowing stoves and pipes to become clogged, and lack of large properly shaped ash trays for cigarettes, etc.

Added was the warning that young children should never be left alone in the house, no matter how "safe" everything seemed.

Mrs. K. MacLeod thanked Mr. Stanley for his many helpful suggestions. There followed a delightful vocal duet by Miss Marcia Knox and Miss Barbara Fleming. Then came a vocal solo by John MacLeod enjoyed by all. Mrs. Wm. Roberts accompanied both duet and solo, on the piano.
