Sir Frederick Grant Banting - A Tribute. By W. E. Robinson.

An Achievement - and an Inspiration MAY 16TH, 1921, he stood in a small, dingy room in the Medical Building of the University of Toronto, a self-appointed seeker, untitled, unpaid, but sustained by a conviction that he was on the track of a great discovery. His name was Frederick Grant Banting, Canadian Surgeon, and he had sold his office furniture and instruments to provide funds for his living costs. He believed he had the key to the dread riddle of diabetes, a disease that had baffled medical science since the dawn of history. Medical opinion was skeptical, but physiologists and biochemists added their efforts and soon the rumour was whispered in hospitals and stricken homes "Banting of Toronto has discovered a treatment for diabetes". The rest is history, as is the fact that Sir Frederick Grant Banting died as he had lived - in the service of his country and of humanity.
