LIVING CONDITIONS IN LONDON

BY LEWIS MILLIGAN

The English are a very patient and long-suffering people, and while they may not at the present time be taking their sufferings cheerfully, they are certainly taking them politely. Londoners in particular seem to me to be the politest people on the face of the earth. They thank you and one another "very much" at every turn, and they will stand for hours in queues for rations and for meals at restaurants, often without avail and without complaint.

One meets with queues everywhere; at the bus stops and railway ticket offices the first come is first served and there is no rush anywhere. But I cannot say that anyone seems to be happy about it, for Londoners struck me from the very beginning to be over-serious.

I would not go so far as to say that I have never seen them smile, but I cannot say that I heard one person laugh during my week's stay in the city. This may be partly a carry-over from the tension and suppression of the war years, but it is chiefly due to the stringent conditions under which they have to live owing to the shortages of food and other commodities, and the wartime restrictions are largely still in force.

So far as the food is concerned, I found it skimmed in quantity and extremely bad in quality, even in the high-class hotels and restaurants where the charges struck me as exorbitant. There are undoubtedly black markets, and they say that you can get anything if you are willing to pay the price; but even when you pay the price for a high-class meal you feel hungry after it. Meat of any kind is very scarce, and fish, which is fairly plentiful, is served in small portions and frequently smelly.

You have to ask for bread, and when you get it you wonder what it is made from, for it is of a greyish color and tastes like nothing at all. Yet the people generally do not appear to be underfed and some seem to be overfed. I should mention that almost everybody begins or finishes off the meal in the restaurants with a pint glass of beer, and one Canadian soldier told

what good would American dollars have been to the American people?" he asked. "The Germans would have been over there. If the Americans don't want to lend us the money — well, we'll get along without it somehow."

In regard to the popular opinion of Mr. Churchill, I found general appreciation of his great leadership during the war, but no one seemed to be greatly concerned over his defeat in the election. The supporters of the Labor Government, while giving him full credit as a war leader, say: "It was not Churchill, but the British people who won the war."

It was told that many leading Conservatives were quite satisfied with the result of the election. For one thing, they point out that with a Labor Government in power there is now "no discontented Left," and the influence of the extremists is curbed. They cite, for instance, the London dock strike when the Labor Government sent the soldiers to unload the ships and keep the strikers in order. When this was done there was no protest from the labor leaders, whereas, if a Conservative Government had taken such action there would have been a great outcry from the labor unions.

Of course you get various opinions about the Labour Government. Generally the feeling is that it is doing its best under the circumstances, and that it should be given a fair chance. Others say that the job is too big for a purely labor government, and they will tell you that it "won't last much longer because the people are tired of so many restrictions, which they hoped would have been removed before this."

A prominent Canadian, who has lived in London throughout the war period, said to me: "You must remember that these people have suffered greatly. I have lived with them through those terrible years, and I know how much and how patiently and heroically they have endured."
