Canada Looks Good To Timmins' Ladies In Recalling Vacation Pleasures

"A beautiful trip!" These are the words of Mrs. J. E. Brunette, Mrs. M. J. Kelly, and Mrs. G. C. Armitage, when asked how they enjoyed seeing Canada's West.

Mayor and Mrs. Brunette left to attend the Mayor's Convention at Vancouver, motoring through Canada and returning through the States. Mrs. Brunette was greatly impressed by Banff, where she spent her thirtieth wedding anniversary, but loved Lake Louise with its warm clear water, beautiful flowers, and snow-capped mountains. A special treat here was a hot springs bath. They made a few reservations ahead, but found nice accommodations when stopping without them.

It was a great thrill going through the Canadian Rockies on the steep narrow roads, said Mrs. Brunette, but an unexpected thrill was on the thirteenth floor of the Vancouver hotel, when the earthquake was taking place, and buildings were swaying dangerously. "The only trouble was," said Mrs. Brunette, "that we had so many things to see, all in only three short weeks."

Mrs. Kelly also held Lake Louise, which she termed a gem of the world, as one of her favorites. She loved the fresh green foliage, the bowers of roses, the vastness of Banff, and the attractive harbor of Victoria. Dr. and Mrs. Kelly went out by C.P.R. a trip which offered spectacular scenery, as well as taking them through two spiral tunnels in the mountains. They returned via the C.N.R. so that as much as possible was seen on the trip.

Mrs. Kelly mentioned that the trip had been arranged weeks in advance, so they had no difficulty in receiving accommodation, but that the hotels were very busy, with many American tourists to look after. Emerald Lake was also a beauty spot, surrounded as it was by high mountains, as was Victoria peak with its two glaciers especially effective when the sun was playing on them. Mrs. Kelly, described her trip as elegant, and brought back with her many beautiful stills and moving pictures of the fabulous Western scenery.

Besides having a glorious motor trip through Canada to Banff, where Dr. Armitage was this district's delegate to the Medical Convention, Mrs. Armitage had the opportunity of visiting with the doctor's mother and father at Victoria as well as with her own brother and sister. She also met many old associates who all showed great interest in their inquiries of the North. Mrs. Armitage found many impressive things about her trip also, especially noting the ruggedness of Banff and calm beautiful Lake Louise with its snow capped mountains.

She found that people were very friendly to tourists, but that one had to stop early for good clean accommodation. Mrs. Armitage especially remembers a very sweet cottage at MacLeod, Alberta. There was always good food wherever they went, but of course a little more expensive in the States. A special treat were Victoria's strawberries, and the huge Bing cherries bought at Washington roadsides in June. Roads were very good, and especially through from Banff to Idaho through the tall trees. At Victoria they drove up over 6000 feet on Mt. Stevens, and the car was eventually submerged in clouds.

The children, Donald and Kathleen, also enjoyed the trip to the fullest having such experiences as throwing snowballs in June, collecting giant pine cones, and feeding the bears. The family also brought back moving pictures, taken as the car drove along, of such animals as elk, moose, deer and bears, as well as of beautiful scenery.

C.A.S. Makes 256 Visits In June

Seventeen applications for children for adoption have been received by the Children's Aid Society for the Cochrane district, according to the report for the month of June, issued by A. G. Carson, superintendent.

Some 256 visits were made during the month, and 1917 miles travelled. Seventy-four office interviews were handled. Eleven complaints were received and handled.

There were 11 children being taken care of in the Shelter and 59 children boarding out. Court attendance was necessary in nine cases. Four children were on probation to court, and two

were made permanent wards, one child was sent to an industrial school; six were placed in foster homes; seven admitted to the shelter. Ten children married Parents Act. There were given hospital and medical care. There were six cases under the Un-

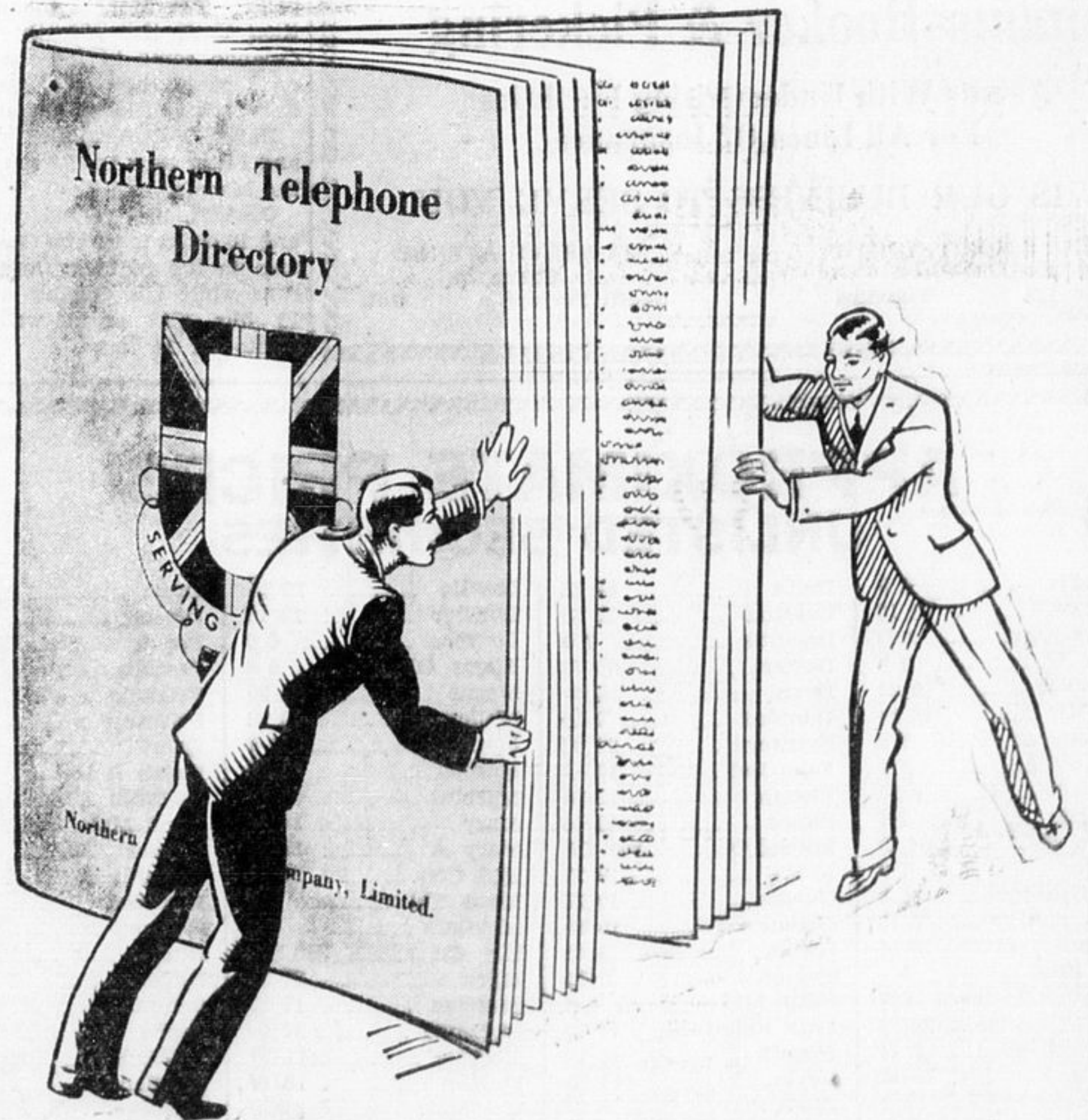
