### Mystery Of Three Missing Coats Is Solved By Police

Orvel Doherty of South Porcupine, one of a trio charged with the theft of three coats from the Riverside Pavilion at a Saturday night dance on June 22, was remanded one week for sentence by Acting Magistrate S. C. Platus in police court here on Tuesday.

Arthur John Draper and Roy Draper, also of South Porcupine were dismissed on the same charge.

The stolen coats were the property of Mrs. W. Strong, Mrs. Doris Brown, of Timmins, and Goldwyn Middleton of Kirkland Lake.

In the evidence presented it was found that the three had been on a heavy drinking bout during that day previous to their going to the pavilion. The three persons losing their coats stated they had arrived at the dance quite late, hanging their coats on the rail around the dance floor. When they returned the coats had gone.

Two weeks following the incident Mrs. Strong had seen a lady wearing her coat on a local street and the police were called. The other two persons did not see their coats again until the court session.

The lady found with the coat stated that a party consisting of her husband, brother of the Draper boys, and her own brother had met the trio at the dance, later going to her home in a taxi. Orvel Doherty, she stated, had carried the two ladies coats and the man's coat in to the house, throwing them on the chesterfield and explaining that the women's coats belonged to his girl friend, who had jilted him, and the man's coat was the property of a friend of his.

He left one of the coats, telling her she could keep it and took the other two away with him, she stated. Later she was taken to the police station when seen wearing the garment. She had then told Detective Gordon Beacock the whole story and informed him where the boys could be found.

Acting on this detective Beacock stated he had gone to South Porcupine and had found the trio, who at that time denied any knowledge of the coats. But shortly after their arrival in Timmins, they informed the detective where the coats could be found, stating that they had been very drunk at the time and could not remember where the coats had been found by them and that further they were too scared to notify police.

### Cars Collide, Both Drivers Charged

A collision of two motor cars on the corner of Wilson Ave. and Cameron St., at 8.57 p.m. on July 13, resulted in two men being charged with driving while drunk.

The men, Jalmar Kuitunen of 60 Balam St. North and Leo Rochon of 16 William St. in Mountjoy Township were scheduled to appear in police court on Tuesday.

The collision occurred when Rochon, travelling north on Cameron St., swung out in a wide turn and collided with Kuitunen's car, which was proceeding down Wilson Ave. From the impact Rochon's car went out across the street and up onto the sidewalk. There were no injuries.

Damage to Kuitunen's car amounted to \$45 and Rochon's car was damaged to the extent of \$30.

### Wields Broom, Gets \$90 In Nickels

Timmins police are at present seeking out an ingenious broom wielding thief, who on July 14 made off with \$90 worth of nickels in 45 bundles holding \$2 in nickels each.

Victim of the theft was E. Yee of the London Cafe on Wilson Ave.

A club bag containing the money had been placed under Mr. Yee's bed and the window is said to have been left partly open.

Came the thief with the broom, pried the window open and hooked onto the club bag under the bed with the broom.

The bag was pulled over to the window and its content of bundled silver removed.

### "Mean Trick", Chief Says of Rose Theft

Described as a "mean trick" by police officials was the action of some person, as yet unknown, in stealing two rose bushes from a Timmins garden during the night of July 14. The roses were taken from the home of D. Lavigne of 8 Messines Ave.

Mr. Lavigne informed police that it was not the action of children, as the rose bushes had been dug up with extreme care. The bushes were in the front garden. Police are still investigating.

### Threatens Neighbor With Bread Knife

William Hadley of 43 Middleton Ave., was assessed \$50 and costs or two months in police court on Tuesday when found guilty of a charge of assaulting A. Labelle, of the same address, in the early hours of Thursday, July 11.

Mr. Labelle stated Hadley had been having a loud party the night before and in the morning had phoned asking him if he were going to work. Labelle stated he answered in the affirmative.

When he left the door, Mr. Labelle said, Hadley was waiting for him with a bread knife in his hand and had said "I am going to kill you." A fight ensued in which Hadley lost his knife but had inflicted a long scratch on the back of Mr. Labelle's neck.

Hadley lived in a house on the rear of the same lot, Labelle stated and there had been arguments between them of late. Hadley was warned not to interfere with Labelle again, by Acting Magistrate S. C. Platus, after sentence had been passed.
