**House Building Adds To Permit Total**

The total of estimated costs for building in Timmins, as recorded on building permits issued from the municipal building during the past week, is \$14,680.

The largest ventures recorded, as building took an upsurge, are two houses to be constructed at the cost of \$3,000 on 48 Floral Ave., and 13 Polaris Rd., by L. Leduc and A. La-forest respectively.

Concrete foundations are being installed to homes owned by J. Bourdin of 19 Carlin Ave., at a cost of \$2,000, and H. Bouvin of 123 Commercial Ave., at a cost of \$1,000.

E. Charron of 5 Carlin Ave., is undertaking the covering of the outside of his home with stucco at an estimated cost of \$1,500.

Twelve other permits issued for repair work and construction brought the above estimates to the above total.
